Do This in Remembrance of Me...

The week of January 22-26 was Week of Prayer for Prairie Voyager School in Grand Forks, ND. The emphasis was on communion and how making decisions for Christ leads to baptism. Each day started with the theme song *Remembrance* by Matt Maher, followed by prayer.

Throughout the week, a presentation was delivered by different members of the Grand Forks Seventh-day Adventist Church relating to the theme topic.



On Monday, Head Elder **Troy Erickson** led a discussion about the importance and sacredness of the communion service. Erickson believes the communion service is an important reminder of the sacrifice of Jesus on our behalf, and that it is not a service to avoid, but one anticipated and participated in with joy. Erickson, also a member of the community service committee, included information about the blessings a person receives through serving in the church and the community.

Roberta Temple, the pastor's wife, came on Tuesday to share her testimony with the students on how her experience at summer camp as a youth led to her baptism. When Temple was 13, living in New

York state, a couple knocked on her family's door and offered to send her brother to camp. Her brother declined. Temple was then asked. She intended to say NO, but the word YES came out of her mouth! Attending Camp Cherokee changed her life! It introduced her to Jesus and the Adventist faith. Studying with the pastor that summer, and later with the couple who sent her to camp, led her to choose Christ. She was baptized the following year during the NY Camp Meeting. Doors were also opened to allow her to attend Union Springs Academy where she met her husband. Several Prairie Voyager students have experienced the blessing of summer camp for themselves and look forward to going every year.



On Wednesday, **Kia Kraulik** brought a slide show of photos from her Maranatha mission trips. Kraulik has been on six Ultimate Workout trips. She began as a participator but now attends as staff. Her earlier trips helped her develop a deep relationship with Jesus. As Kraulik witnessed the poverty the people experienced, in comparison to the abundance people have in the USA, it sparked an idea for a service project. On a mission trip to Panama, she and her two sisters asked the church and their local community to donate shoes to take with them to give away. They were able to hand out about 300 pairs of shoes. On that trip Kia and her sister Kari were baptized.

Logan Rubbert presented on Thursday. Rubbert was a student at Prairie Voyager in 2002-2004 for grades 7 and 8. In Mrs. Erickson's first year of teaching, she taught Rubbert for his final year, grade 8. Rubbert was able to share with the students the benefits of attending an Adventist school and how it makes it easier to follow Jesus. Rubbert had also attended public school and shared some of the challenges he had faced to keep a strong relationship with Jesus during that time. During his time at Prairie Voyager, Rubbert made the choice for baptism.

Pastor **Mike Temple** came on Friday for a very special service. Mrs. Erickson and Pastor worked together to teach the students about the communion service by partaking in one together as a class. Pastor walked them through the steps of the

Mrs. Erickson wanted to provide an opportunity for the students to ask questions and receive answers during this service, which would normally be disruptive during a regular church service.

Coronado Casserole

1 c chopped onion

1/2 to 1 can (4oz) green chiles, drained

1/2 t ground cumin

1/2 t ground oregano

1/2 c vegetarian chicken-style broth

1 can (8oz) tomato sauce

2 c diced chik

3 c cooked rice

1 c sour Cream

2 c shredded cheese

1 1/2 c crushed corn chips



In 1 1/2 quart microwave dish, combine first 6 items. Cover and microwave on high for 10 minutes. Stir after 5 minutes and add chicken. Stir and set aside. Combine rice and sour cream and put in greased shallow 2 1/2 quart microwave dish. Sprinkle with cheese. Spoon chicken mixture over cheese and top with remaining cheese. Microwave on high for 5 minutes. Sprinkle with crushed chips and let stand 5 minutes before serving.


