Tuesday, May 29, I received an email from a Dustin Comm. He is the Communication Specialist for Maranatha Volunteers International. It read in part, "I was wondering if I could ask you a favor? We are trying to recruit as many volunteers as possible for our project at Northern Lights Camp July 1-15, but haven't received a ton of response yet. I was hoping you have a conference email newsletter we could promote the project in? It would be great to get local help if anyone is able.

"Here is the project website: https://maranatha.org/projects/tgid2752/. Volunteers will construct a new cafeteria building for the camp. They will help with the wood framing, siding as well as roofing and window installation."

I assured him there would be no shortage of help from Dakotans. Comm said there were only eight volunteers registered now but none of them

were from the Daktoas. To ease the concerns of Maranatha's project leaders, you may want to sign up so there is an accurate count for housing and food needs. Delilah Treft will be the camp cook during the project. There is also a cap of 30 volunteers needed at any one time. You may choose to call Dustin Comm to register. His number is 916.774.7743.

Neil Biloff contacted the State Park yesterday for permission to move heavy equipment through the park into the camp and they gave their okay. The road restrictions have held up progress until yesterday.

Electrician Larry Nordman, of the Minot Adventist Church, has worked tirelessly to reroute the electrical. Biloff spent hours digging trenches so plumber Dennis Tefts, of the Williston Adventist Church, could make water and septic accessible to the new building site.

Live is Like the Backside of a Tapestry



"But now ask the beasts, and they will teach you; and the birds of the air, and they will tell you; or speak to the earth, and it will teach you; and the fish of the sea will explain to you. Who among all these does not know that the hand of the Lord has done this?" Job 12:7-9.

But when earthquakes, tsunamis, tornados, floods, and hurricanes hit, how do we relate to God then? Is God behind those natural horrors as well?

When disaster strikes, many find it difficult to reconcile the pictures of destruction with the idea of a loving, caring God. Some even view these events as God's judgment upon the evil of the world. Religious leaders from across the spectrum use these tragedies as opportunities to speculate wildly. The phrases "divine judgment" and "retribution" are tossed about, sparking controversy and outrage.

We tend to think that life here should be fair because God is fair. But God is not life here. God is behind life. He is the Author of life, the Hope of life, and the End of life. A painter, while "seen" in her painting, is not the painting itself. She will especially not be seen in the work when her enemies have the ability to spoil it.

Life here is like the backside of a tapestry, its threads all jumbled with indistinct, muted colors and clashing patterns. We can sort of make out the picture. But it's not until we get on the front side of the tapestry, the other side of life here, that we experience the full design, the reason for every knotted red and gray and black and white thread. Only then can we truly see what the Master Artist has created.

No matter what we may face in this life we can "know that all things work together for good to those who love God" (Romans 8:28). In all circumstances, we can know that nothing - neither disease, drought, devil or death - will be able to separate us from the love of God.

This December 19, 2018, five college students and three members of the Fargo Adventist Church are conducting a mission trip to United Nation refugee camps in Northern Uganda.

The UN tent cities in north western Uganda are filled with individuals and families, mostly children, who have escaped intra-governmental killing in their home of origin - Sudan.

Just Jesus. Adventist Campus Ministries and the Fargo Adventist Church plan to travel to Uganda to accomplish the following goals for God:

- 1. Conduct evangelistic, revival meetings in northern Uganda,
- 2. Assist with the construction of a well for fresh, clean water for the Adventist school and school garden,
- 3. Make mental health counselors available for individuals suffering with trauma disorders and depression.
- 4. Provide a Relationship Communication Seminar to help families, couples and all individuals to learn how to deal with conflict and communicate in a healthy way to de-escalate stress and tensions,
- 5. Conduct health seminars instructing on good hygiene and disease prevention.

Seventeen thousand dollars (\$17,000) needs to be raised for the Adventist school dorm buildings, a PA system for public speaking and the cost of drilling a well for the school. Donations should be marked "Uganda Mission" and made payable to the:




Science Fair Presented at Invitation Hill




The whole fair was a huge success and I think the students and judges had a wonderful time. We have asked a couple of our fellow classmates and they said that the science fair was awesome.


