Early Adventist Health - 1907 Chamberlain Sanitarium and Hospital - Final Episode

Sanitarium residence cottages and nurses dormitory affords accommodations for seventy-five nurses and employees outside the main Sanitarium building.

Nearly seventy nurses and employees are necessary to care for the patients and keep the Sanitarium buildings and grounds in order.

There is a parlor on the main floor which is used as a lecture room for patients. Entertainments are given here from time to time to vary sanitarium life. The third floor has a writing room and library for the use of patients. The fourth floor has a sun parlor for convalescing patients.

Groups of convalescing patients gather on the verandas and in the parlors for social entertainments.

A complete record of each patient's case is kept in the business office where also all business arrangements are made.

A safety hydraulic elevator and a private telephone in each room adds to the patient's comfort and convenience.

Beautiful scenery cheers the eye and is restful. Nothing can compare to healthful outdoor exercise as a nerve tonic.

Physical culture classes are held daily in the spacious gymnasium led by a trained director. In the summer time the outdoor gymnasium is a special feature. Physical exercises conducted with reference to the patients' needs combined with other remedial measures, bring results.

Many visitors remark, "I never imagined so beautiful a location in the west." The river, hills, natural forest and the intense blue sky rivaling the famous Italian sky combine to make this indeed a picturesque location.

Again and again patients remark, "We ought to get well in this beautiful place without treatment." The shade trees and smooth green lawns with croquet and other games is a valuable adjunct to the Sanitarium treatment.

Following is the Loma Linda timeline - 1905

- February 4 - Ellen G. White's letter says: "A place must be provided to which the sick could be taken, where they could be taught how to live so as to preserve health."
- April 28- General Conference telegram to John Burden instructs him not to make deposit on Loma Linda.
- May 14 - Mrs. White writes in a letter, "Dear Brother Burden: Secure the property by all means."
- May 29 - John Burden pays \$1,000 down to buy Loma Linda.
- June 12 - Mrs. White visits Loma Linda for first time.
- July 26 - \$5,000 from unexpected sources arrives on deadline of second payment for Loma Linda.
- August 22 - Mrs. White writes: "This is the most delightful situation for a sanitarium I have ever seen."
- August 24 - Loma Linda Sanitarium incorporates with John Burden as president.
- October 12 - Sanitarium admitted first patients. Horse and buggies picked up patients from the train station.
- November 1 - Loma Linda Sanitarium officially opens.
- November - Loma Linda Sanitarium accepts first nursing students.

Also from the Chamberlain Sanitarium booklet:

A training school for nurses is carried on in connection with the regular sanitarium work and graduate or undergraduate nurses of experience attend to every need of the patients and by careful attention make them comfortable and hasten their recovery very materially.

The Sanitarium also gives the regular academic course to worthy young people of limited means. This is taken advantage of by many young men and women who have no other means of obtaining an education.

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The church has been blessed with visionaries. It seems the Chamberlain Sanitarium and Loma Linda Sanitarium were contemporaries. It is too bad they both didn't survive. And with that we conclude the history of the Chamberlain Sanitarium.

"Barn Again" News

Sue Schlafmann, member of the McClusky Adventist Church, and her husband Wayne received the "Barn Again Award" in 1995. The program, began in 1987, was an effort to save historic barns. "The program has shown how historic barns can be adapted for new farming uses ranging from dairy, hog, and cattle operations to machinery or grain storage. "Barn preservation techniques have proven to be cost-effective alternatives to tearing down the old barn and putting up a new building," according to a Successful Farming article written in 2010. https://www.agriculture.com/machinery/buildings-and-bins/About-BARN-AGAIN_221-ar6507

The Schlafmann barn was built in 1910. "You have to be using the barn and doing the necessary upkeep (which they still do) to win the award," says Schlafmann. This award is given by the US Historical Society. Barns are chosen from every state. After the Schlafmanns' received the award, John Deere featured their barn in its calendar.

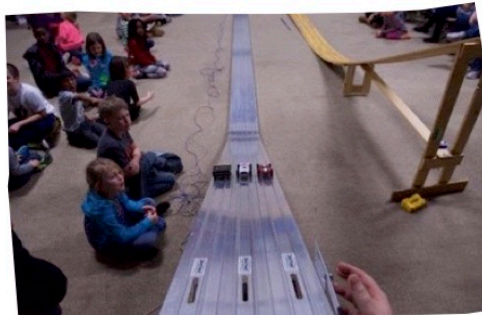

Hermosa Adventist Church Family Develops Vegan Ice Creme

Rapid City shop opens with secret recipe vegan ice creme



Biologist Paul Jarvis has a dream to make the best dairy-free ice creme on the market. After spending nearly three years developing a secret recipe, Jarvis' ice creme is now delighting Black Hills residents.

Jarvis and his wife, Kim, opened DeVine Delights vegan ice creme — not cream since his product is dairy free — parlor and deli in Rapid City in May. They serve vanilla, chocolate and strawberry ice creme daily, plus five additional flavors such as bananas foster, mango, peanut butter, mocha and cookie flavors. Pumpkin spice ice creme will be added this fall. DeVine Delights also makes its own Italian ices, gelato, ice cream sandwiches and brownie sundaes.

"The most popular by far is anything with chocolate," Jarvis said, chuckling. "There are days our ice creme flies out the door. ... People really like our dairy-free ice creme. There's a lot of people who are bringing in their children that are allergic to dairy, but (our customers are) not just people who are allergic to dairy. A lot of people are just stopping by and getting ice creme."

Paul and Kim Jarvis, both biologists and vegans, lived in Montana cattle country before moving to South Dakota. They understand the challenges of finding delicious options when eating a diet limited by allergies, food intolerances or a choice to avoid animal products.

DeVine Delights fills a need in the local market for a vegan restaurant, Jarvis said.

"We saw how difficult it was for people who are vegetarian or vegan to access plant-based foods here in Rapid City. Even though there are restaurants that offer vegan options, it's hard to tell whether they will make sure your foods are not contaminated with animal products," Jarvis said.

DeVine Delights serves vegan soups, sandwiches, entrees, salads, cinnamon rolls and desserts; some are gluten-free. Jarvis' artisanal ice creme is the signature item. The ice creme is entirely plant based, made from Jarvis' original proprietary blend. Jarvis will only reveal that his ice creme is created with an ingredient grown in South Dakota. The ice creme is all natural and does not contain nuts, artificial colors or ingredients. Haagen-Dazs, Ben & Jerry's and other top brands make vegan ice creme from nuts such as cashews, almonds or coconut, Jarvis said.

"I used my knowledge of food science and chemistry, and I had some ideas about things I could combine to make this plant-based ice cream," Jarvis said. "I started doing a lot of research about the ice cream industry and how ice cream is made and the science behind it. I combined that with my experimentations and finally came up with an ice creme that tastes like dairy but isn't dairy."

Aside from the taste and the sense of accomplishment, making dairy-free ice cream comes with a fun factor. "Ice cream makes people smile," Jarvis said.

The Jarvises believe the timing is right for a vegan restaurant in Rapid City. The vegan food industry overall is growing rapidly, Jarvis said, because of people who want to eat healthfully, people who have dietary issues, and age.

"To a great extent (the industry) is being driven by millennials. We receive a great deal of support from the millennial population here in town," Jarvis said. "Most of the people coming to us are vegan or vegetarian. We get a few people who are curious. We get a lot of people who are carnivores who say, 'I just want to try your food.' ... We have incredible foods you would never know are vegan."

DeVine Delights is on the first floor of the Turnac Tower, 909 St. Joseph St. Hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Thursday, 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Friday. For more information, go to facebook.com/DeVineIceCream.

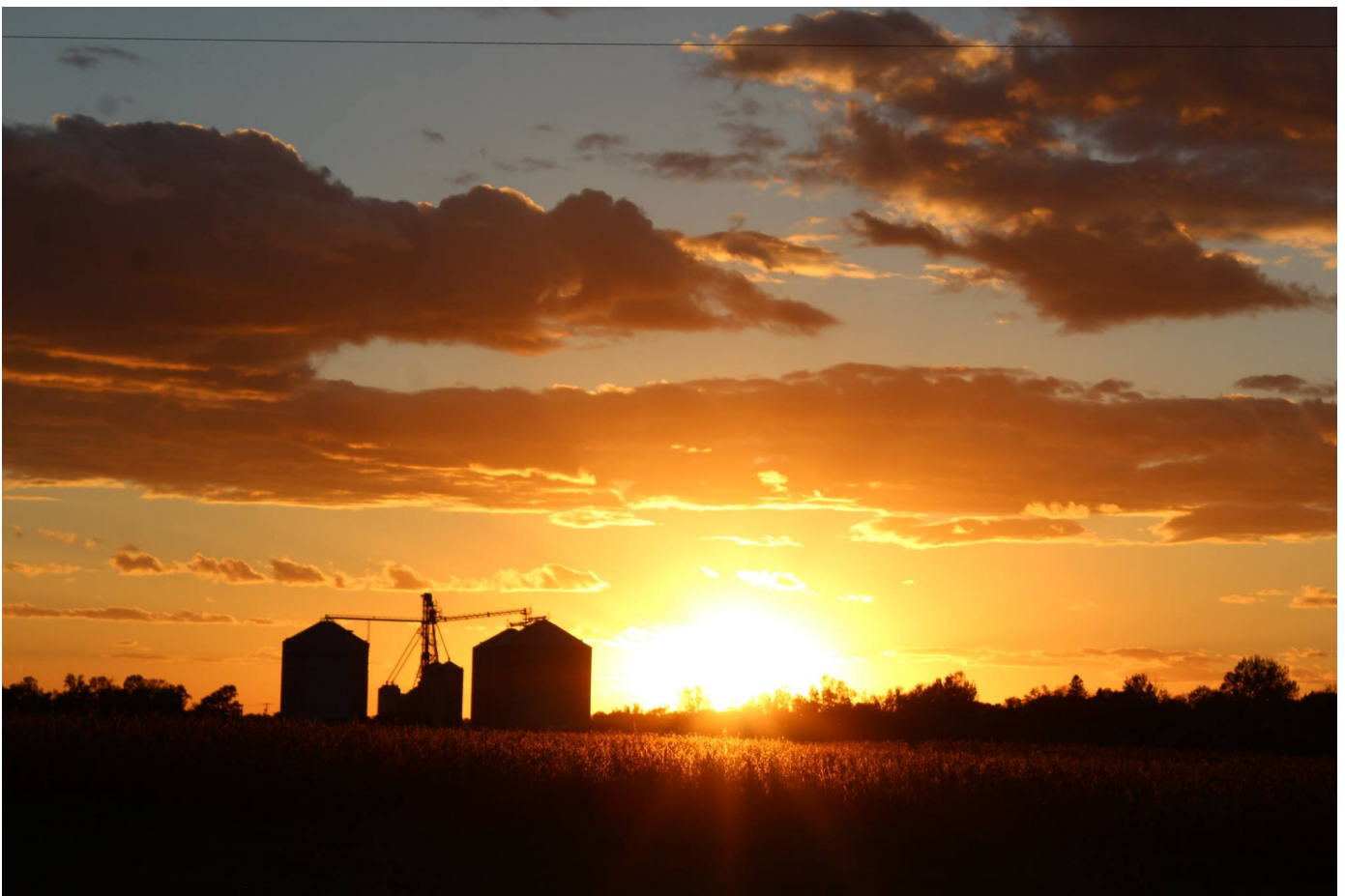
