Head Strong, 8 Ways to Reduce Your Risk of Alzheimer's (Part 1)

Most people haven't heard of type 3 diabetes. But they probably know the condition by its more common name: Alzheimer's.



Alzheimer's isn't a normal part of aging. It causes symptoms such as memory loss, dramatic mood swings, an inability to focus, and problems controlling the body. These symptoms are the result of on-going brain damage. Alzheimer's causes proteins to become like twisted threads inside the brain's nerve cells (neurofibrillary tangles). It also causes damaged protein deposits to build up plaque in the spaces between the brain's nerve cells (called beta-amyloid plaques). There are about five FDA-approved medications to treat some symptoms related to language skills, memory, and some behavior problems. But there's no medication-based cure, and the drug benefits are short-lived.

Researchers aren't sure why some people get Alzheimer's and others don't. Evidence shows that having a family history of Alzheimer's means a great risk. Alzheimer's is sometimes linked to diabetes, high blood pressure, and high cholesterol, and sometimes, although more rarely, to having had a head injury earlier in life. The Alzheimer's Association International Conference held in Toronto, Canada, in 2016 presented data showing that Alzheimer's and dementia have more than 50 associated risk factors, including low thyroid levels, high homocysteine levels (an amino acid linked to heart attacks and strokes), and elevated blood fats.

Conventional medicine hasn't offered much hope. But there's actually a lot you can do to decrease your risk, or even reverse symptoms. "New research shows how combined natural strategies can powerfully reverse memory loss and cognitive decline," says Wes Youngberg, Dr.P.H., a clinical nutritionist, lifestyle medicine specialist, and a founding director and fellow of American College of Lifestyle Medicine and author of HELLO HEALTHY.

Little Acts of Kindness Made a Huge Difference

"Chaplain, we're going to need you at the emergency room; there has been a crash involving a family, and it's a bad one." The tone of the sergeant's voice was grave and subdued. On Sunday, March 25, 2018, State Highway Patrol Chaplain Mike Temple received a chilling call. A horrific accident on Interstate 29, near Grand Forks, North Dakota, had claimed the lives of two small boys and had seriously injured their mother and 3-year old sister.

Pastor Mike of the Grand Forks Seventh-day Adventist church navigated his way through the heavy snow, to lend any support he could to the shocked and grieving family. The church family was notified of the tragedy, and members began praying for this mother who had lost her only two sons; Camden (9), and Maxwell (18 months). Leanne Erickson, teacher of Prairie Voyager Christian Elementary School, shared the sad news with her students. Together the students lifted the family in prayer each morning during worship.

In June, the grieving mother implemented a toy drive in Fargo, North Dakota, as a way of honoring the memory of her sons. Local non-profits received the new toys to distribute to impoverished families. Upon learning of the toy drive, Pastor Temple contacted the mother and offered to help her expand the project into the Grand Forks area. During the month of August, collection receptacles were placed in eight businesses around Grand Forks. With local television coverage about the campaign, city residents soon began flooding the bins with new toys.



Pastor Mike invited the Prairie Voyager teacher and students to help distribute flyers at Home of Economy, a department store in Grand Forks. WDAZ, a Grand Forks television station, sent a reporter to cover the event. Leanne Erickson and two of her students were interviewed to share their thoughts on the project. "We prayed for this family, and now we get to help in a physical way," said Leanne. "It made me feel good to help with the toy drive and



help someone else," added Kenzie, a 2nd grade student.

The new toys were collected and brought to the fellowship hall at the Grand Forks Church where Prairie Voyager students helped sort and

prepare the toys for distribution. Students also gave the mother handmade cards and reassured her of their continued prayers. It was a meaningful and personal way of showing love and concern to a mother who was struggling to navigate her grief.

Our students have increased their witnessing presence in the community during the 2017-18 school year. Students Engaged for Eternity (S.E.E.), is the Dakota Conference initiative for the 2018-19 school year. The Prairie Voyager Christian Elementary will aim for two outreach activities a month. Plans include: visiting local assisted living residents, reading to dogs at the local humane society, and a baby supply drive in March for the local pregnancy center.



We live in a world marred by pain, devastation, and grief. Little acts of kindness make a huge difference. Our students are experiencing the positive effects of being Christ's representatives in their community.
