Can toxic thinking make you sick?



Herbert Benson, M.D., the president of Harvard Medical School's Mind-Body Institute, maintains that toxic thoughts lead to stress, which affects the body's natural healing capacities. Toxic thinking literally "wears down" the brain and the rest of the body.

Neuroscientist Caroline Leaf, Ph.D., author of <u>Switch on Your Brain: The Key to Peak Happiness</u>, <u>Thinking</u>, <u>and Health</u>, says that the average person has over 30,000 thoughts each day. When we have "toxic" thoughts - fear and negativity instead of forgiveness, peace, and love - those negative thoughts trigger more than 1,400 physical and chemical responses and more than 30 different hormones.

"Research is showing direct links between negative toxic thinking and neurological diseases like Alzheimer's and dementia and Parkinson's," writes Leaf. "Medical research increasingly points to the fact that thinking and consciously controlling your thought life is one of the best ways, if not the best way, of detoxing your brain. What we think about affects us physically and emotionally." And what we think directs our lifestyle choices - choices such as whether or not we'll binge on sugary treats or exercise regularly.
