1970 Penny Campaign Revisited

On Sunday, September 6, 1970, at 2:00 pm in the Sheyenne River Academy auditorium/gym, the North Dakota Conference Penny Campaign came to an exciting end after its debut at Campmeeting in June. Elder William Elder Jr., conference president, and Cliff Hoffman, conference MV director, started calling alphabetically the roll call of churches. One by one they came, presenting their pennies in the most unique ways. A large flax box was placed on the floor in front of the platform. As the church's name was called, they came down the wide center aisle and placed their pennies in the box to help pay for the Northern Lights Camp lodge.

The presentations were really something to see. Every conceivable container was used – little red wagons, larger wagons pulled by ponies or mules, hollowed-out logs, water buckets, a fire hose made into a snake, replicas of Northern Lights Camp Lodge, treasure boxes, jars and pails, bags filled with pennies over mules' backs or shoulders, thieves' loot, mini bikes pulling in wagons full, and a motorcycle with side car filled with pennies. It was an hour and a half of thrilling presentations.

After the last presentation, a panel of judges, men from the Northern Union Conference office, got their heads together to determine the church which had the most unique and interesting presentation. C. M. Willison, chairman of the panel of judges, announced the winner - the decision was Minot! They had a float with a replica of the new lodge filled with pennies. A sign on the float read "Pull Out Stopper, Fill With Copper." The stopper was a cork chimney on the roof of the lodge. The boys and girls of the Minot Church sang a song about the new lodge.

Special honors went to the Bowdon Country Church, which raised a total of 73,370 pennies – 17,000 pennies more than double their goal – the largest amount of any church. It was a tremendous feat, considering the size of their church.

Right in the middle of the presentations, John Amick, the Book & Bible House manager, came riding in on a motorcycle with a sidecar. The sidecar was filled with 50,000 pennies, a surprise gift from the Book & Bible House.

After the presentations were over, Senator Quentin Burdick gave a short speech. In his speech he praised the Adventist church for involving the youth in such a wholesome project. His speech was filled with some good counsel. He told everyone to make their homes happy homes for the youth. He suggested this may mean that more mothers should stay home with their children, rather than going out to work all day. After his speech, Elder Hoffman presented him with a book just off the press, *The Builders*. It is a pectoral report of the work of Seventh-day Adventists around the world.

Elder Hoffman also presented W. G. Summers, vice-president of the Stutsman County Bank in Jamestown, a book in appreciation for his and the bank's work in handling all the pennies. Mr. Summers told the people how the pennies would be taken care of and that the Federal Reserve System was sending a Brink's armored truck all the way from Minneapolis to Jamestown just to pick up the pennies. He told Mr. Hoffman he was sure it would be the first time a Brink's armored truck had ever been to Jamestown.

The finale for the day was a speech by Smoking Sam. Sam had been saving pennies too. In fact, at the end of the day he had 4,000 pennies in his jar. Right in the middle of Sam's speech, he pulled a surprise on Elder and Mrs. William Elder. He announced that it was their 28th wedding anniversary. Sam said, "Can you imagine anyone throwing such a big party for his wife on their anniversary? I wonder what Brother Elder will do for

an encore next year on their anniversary?" After Sam's speech, Alice Hinger and Mrs. Janice Hoffmann presented the Elders with a potted plant for their big day.

It truly was an unforgettable day. The total objective was 1,000,000 pennies. When Elder Reuben Beck added up the totals it came to 820,000 pennies. Several churches have yet to report. Who knows – we still may make the 1,000,000 mark, which would be a tremendous victory for the North Dakota Conference.




