Hijacked

Have you ever considered that your faith may represent something it wasn't originally designed to? Has it become a tool to serve other agendas? Is your Christianity being used to impress someone, increase your social status, promote a political party, attain money, buttress a moral belief, or fill intellectual, emotional and relational voids? If any of the above is true, perhaps your faith has been hijacked.



In early New Testament history many young Jewish men were swept into the religious-political warfare of their time. Faith had become a battle cry to weaponize and unite a people against the evil Roman empire. Young zealots died believing they were fighting for their faith, but to what end? Others used their faith to make connections and grow their bank accounts. In his book *Messiah in His Sanctuary*, F.C. Gilbert writes that during the time of Jesus a priest could be financially set for life if he was high priest during the Passover ceremony. Gilbert states that an occasional high priest mysteriously died just before Passover. History reveals some have justified the killings stating it was for the good of the church.

True, none of us reading these words would ever think of doing such horrible things, but just maybe our faith in Jesus and His word has been hijacked in other ways. In today's society could being mean and hateful to others be self-justified as good of one's church or faith? Could sharing internet information filled with accusations based on hearsay, gossip and conspiracies be considered a blessing to the Kingdom of God? Could we as Adventists be caught up in our own form of holy war against anyone who disagrees with us? We are living in amazing times and it appears that the Christian faith can quickly morph into something it was never intended to become. Is it time to cleanse our spirituality from the things that have hijacked it?

The prophet Micah said it well when he described true faith and religion, "He hath shown you, O man, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God." It seems true religion is quite basic and simple. Why in these last days has it become so difficult to walk in the plain words of the prophet?

Since November, I have had the chance to crisscross our conference. The only population areas I have not yet been to are Willison and Pierre. I have been in all of our schools except one while school was in session and I have had the chance to speak in several of our churches. One seven-day stretch took me to Watertown for Sabbath, Fargo for a church meeting on Tuesday night, and then to Rapid City early Thursday morning so I could spend time at the school. I share this because as I am beginning to understand my role and our constituency, I am finding several realities that both amaze and impress me. From notes of encouragement to positive attitudes to wise council (especially from those who serve on the K-12 Board and Executive Committee). I have met many dedicated, conscientious, hard-working, down-to-earth, God-fearing people. And for that I am thankful.

I am a pragmatist at heart. I want things that work and for work to go smoothly. I sense that same sort of attitude across our conference. New ideas are great, they just need to be ones that make sense and make things easier. And that is my desire as I serve the church family in the Dakotas. I want to strive to help things make sense, and to make things easier. This is a journey I am looking forward to.



DAA Hosts Robotics Meet

After participating in robotics events in recent years, Dakota Adventist Academy hosted their first robotics meet on January 17, under the sponsorship of Ryan and Tracy Peterson. Held in the recently renovated DAA gymnasium, nine teams participated in the regional meet: DAA, Tioga, Alexander, Wilton, Bismarck's Career Academy and Technology Center, Shiloh Christian, St. Mary's Central, Williston and another school from the Minot area. Described by organizers as a "scrimmage," the gathering was a pre-season opportunity for students to test their electro-mechanical creations against peers – and the clock - in an official competition-level arena.



Student-built from a variety of electronic, mechanical and structural elements, robots feature limited computer-programming and are designed to perform specific functions. This year's challenge required the ability to lift and move sizable plastic blocks around obstacles between two points within the 12' X 12' arena. As each machine is controlled remotely by two students, a pilot and a lift-function operator, operation demands practiced cooperation and split-second decision-making. Within each two-minute match points are awarded for number of blocks moved a minimum distance, blocks placed or stacked on a special tray, and for other time and performance achievements. Together, these elements produce not only great team excitement, but a lot of fun for spectators as well.

After the initial rounds of single head-to-head competition, clubs were paired for the elimination rounds based on accumulated points. The demand for teamwork kicked into high gear, as clubs could maximize their standing points by optimizing cooperative efforts with their new teammates. In the limited space of the arena this proved to be a challenge but the pairings did well, improving as the matches went on.

The DAA "Tinheads" team made the final rounds, and their paired team placed second overall. DAA students participating included Orrin Waldner, Colton Playle, Elena Goldsberry, Austin Hay, DaYeong Ko, Jaelyn Pickett, PawLay Pway, Rosalyn Ray and Casey Waldner. Two DAA

team members unable to attend were Tasian Subigca and Sierra Schlenker.

"This was an excellent way to be involved in a larger way in our community and region while showcasing our school," said



principal Anthony Oucharek. "We hope our visitors enjoyed their stay and will share positively with others about what they experienced."

A Call to Prayer Pastor Barry St. Clair, Prayer Ministries

BISMARCK, ND — Dakota Conference pastors, studying spirituality and church growth in mid-January, urged for a conference-wide week of prayer and fasting March 1 - 7, 2020.

"Research of Adventist churches indicates spirituality or the spiritual culture of the church is the main indicator of whether Adventist churches in the North American Division are growing or in decline," said S. Joseph Kidder, professor from Andrews University Seminary while sharing with Dakota Conference staff and pastors gathered at the Conference office.

"What are you as spiritual leaders going to do?" Kidder queried while presenting Biblical fasting and prayer as a personal connection with the God.

Dakota Conference has faced challenges of declining participation over the past five years with 2019 presenting particular financial challenges relating to weather impacts on donors' commodities production and harvest in both North and South Dakota.

"Why don't we, as a conference, commit to at least one day of fasting and prayer together, petitioning God; laying the challenges we are facing before His throne?" one pastor suggested.

The pastors and conference staff prayed together, and then discussed plans for each pastor to return to their districts and conduct some preaching on Biblical prayer and fasting.

Throughout Scripture, God invites His people to come to Him in humility, seeking and petitioning Him to act on behalf of His kingdom and for His glory. This isn't a magic wand, demanding, earning or legalism. It is our privilege to cooperate with the Holy Spirit's calling and participate in the intercessory ministry of our High Priest, King Jesus, laying before the throne of grace what God already knows. God offers us the invitation to be active in His Kingdom community through the avenue of prayer.

Fasting is simply an act of denying self in some area, whether media, food, or other areas of life, in order to redirect time and attention away from self, to connect with the God of the universe.

"My wife and I are determined to pray for more of our fellow pastors beginning now," said Pastor Roy Morris, Yankton - Hurley, SD district. "We also will incorporate prayers for our evangelism series as we pray for the health and well-being of our conference as a whole, during the week of prayer and fasting."

There are several ways you may participate. First, pray and ask God what He wants you to do. Perhaps a day or two, within your schedule during the week, to fast at a safe level within your context and in consult with your primary care provider. Reinvest the time of food preparation and cleanup, or screen time to prayer and reflection on Scripture.

Dakota Conference Prayer Coordinator, Pastor Barry St. Clair, regularly participates with the North American Division of Seventhday Adventists' monthly All-night Prayer Call and plans to represent Dakota Conference to the NAD prayer team Thursday, March 5.




