



## Keene Seventh-day Adventist Church's History, Part 1

The first Seventh-day Adventist in the Keene, North Dakota area came from Richardton, ND to work for Cal Dodge. His name was Esley Henderson. His mother's dying request, in 1915, was that meetings be held in her son's community and Elder A. V. Roads promised. So, in 1917, Elder Roads held meeting in the Veeder school house. Tony, Josie and Rose Steiner came, as well as Esley Henderson. Melchoir Steiner forbade his daughter Rose to go, so she crawled out the window to get past him. Tony, Josie, Rose and Esley decided to become Adventists. That fall Rose married Esley and they held Sabbath School in their home. A neighbor, Mrs. Fred Wheeler, attended and joined also. Later, her husband Fred and their seven children became members as well.

In the fall of 1917, Elder T. R. Nash held meetings in Unity Hall. Alfred and Marie Hagen and her son, Leslie Van Allen and Mrs. Clyde (Anna) Mercer joined the Sabbath School.

In 1918, church members met at the Gregnew Clear Creek School. Rose Henderson was ordained there by Elder Nash, as deaconess, the office she has held ever since.\*1

Later, Viola Foreman and her family came from Idaho. Increased membership required a larger meeting place so Unity Hall was used for Sabbath Services. Sabbath School was organized by Elder Clarence Rentfro. The hall served for the group for about ten years. Then the company moved to Pleasant Valley school house, which was more centrally located.

There was no regular district minister. In severe winter weather the families met in member's homes. Some of the ministers who visited in those early years were Elder Jackson, Elder Carscallen, Elder Piper and Elder Krietzky. Once the Home Missionary Secretary, Elder J. J. Jutzy, came to Sanish\*2 by train. He did not realize there was no mail delivery and so no one met him at the depot. He started walking the thirty-five long hilly miles to the Henderson home.

In 1939, Sabbath School moved to the Sandstone School, near the Lovaas home. In the early 1930s Clarence and Bertha Lovaas, Walter Mercer and Mathilda Peterson were baptized, through the labors of Ted and Martha Wick.

In 1944, James and Lola Pogue had just graduated from Union College. They came with Francis and Mary Sue Wernick to Keene and held meetings at Unity Hall. Clinton Loomer brought his wife to the meeting one mile in the rain on his tractor because it was too muddy for the car. Esley Henderson had two new granaries and the Wernicks and Pogues set up housekeeping in them at the Henderson ranch where there was a well. The Hendersons had a lot of fun with the young enthusiastic couples, who were there from July until September when they went to Williston. At Christmas the Pogues and the Wernicks visited the Henderson ranch and Esley said, "The kids all came home for the holidays."

The members met in the Sandstone School until 1952, when they bought a building from the Roman Catholic congregation, located near Croff's and moved it eighteen miles with tractors to about two miles south of Keene, and remodeled it into their "present" church.

This little company was formally organized into a church by Elder A. E. Milner, president of the North Dakota Conference in the fall of 1954. There were 22 charter members: Rose Henderson; Alfred and Marie Haugen; Clarence and Bertha Lovass; Charles Mercer; his mother, Anna Pittsley; Lyle and (Texie) Haziel Henderson; Paul and Hazel Henderson; Pearl Sivertson; Elisha and Ruby Hiestand, Joyce Lovaas; Leo Lovaas; Robert Lovaas; Swan Belquist; Sally Foreman; Alice Sivertson (now Boyko); LaVonne Sivertson (now Fandrich) and Ernestine Marshall.

The church was dedicated October 1, 1960 by K. D. Johnson, president of the North Dakota Conference. The sermon was given by R. H. Nightingale, Northern Union President and the benediction by S. E. White, secretary of the North Dakota Conference. Gary Schwarz, the pastor, sang "Bless this House." Clarence Lovaas played the violin and the piano was played by Elaine Olson and Joyce Lovaas.

# Why Do We Pray in Jesus' Name?



The question has been asked, why do we pray in Jesus' name? There are a couple of reasons.

First, Jesus is described by John in Revelation 3:7 as having the key of David.

When I served in the military, we had an awesome supply chain. Nearly everything the US government possessed was available to me on two conditions - authorization and the gatekeeper at the supply depot.

It was no different in ancient times. Isaiah 22:22 speaks of King Hezekiah giving the key of David to the steward of the treasury. This key granted access not only to the storehouses, but to the palace to be able to make timely delivery of necessities to the kings' court.

Jesus holds the keys to the treasure trove of heaven. Paul wrote in Ephesians 1:3, "Blessed be

the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing..."

The second reason we pray in Jesus' name is because He is our mediator between us and God the Father. He is the only Way to the Father and the resources we need.

Dr. Luke cites Jesus in chapter 11:13, "If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him?" So, what we need most is the Holy Spirit. Our communication with heaven is dependent upon God, His son, His word and His Spirit.

Notice what Paul wrote to the Romans in chapter 8:26-27, "In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans. And He who searches our hearts knows the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for God's people in accordance with the will of God."

We pray in Jesus' name because God has blessed us with everything in Him, because He holds the keys to heaven's resources, and because everything is subject to His will. He is King of kings, and Lord of lords.


"Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God," Philippians 4:6.


