

Keene Adventist Church's History Part 2 of 3

In 1929 Marie and Alfred Haugen had church school in their home for Dan and Wilson Haugen, and the Wick's, Wheeler's and Tony Steimer's children. Anna Petersen was the teacher. Marie had taught Dan at home for a year so he started in the second grade. After four years they went to public school. Then in 1939, Clarence Haugen and Mary Ann Van Nurden, the two oldest children of John Dahl's and Arlene Boyko's sister were the pupils. Teachers were Arlene Boyko and Adeline Heitzmann. After five years or more, students attended public school.

In 1954, when the church was formally organized, the first elder was Paul Henderson; now his oldest son, James, holds that office.

Our largest church enrollment was in 1962. Besides the charter members (18 left then) Lawrence Peterson; Donald Lovaas; Judy Lovaas; Marlys Sivertson; Linda Lovaas; James Henderson; Merlyn Chambers; Lois Chambers; David Ritchie and Donna, Doris and David Jr.; Al and Julia Rikustad; Anna Peterson; Lyleen and Lyle Jr. Henderson; Gordon, David, Wayne and Laurie Foreman; Dixie Ritchie; Patsy, Penny, Donna and Dennis Henderson; Florence and Howard Bell - 46 souls. Since then these joined: Floyd, Elizabeth, Celia, Ellen and Nita Goss; Lance, Rita and Nita Foreman; Myrtis Bonner; Larry and Kimber Henderson; Darlene Jorgenson, now Young Bear; Frances Braaten; Jean Rindy; Kenneth (Mike) Schmidt and Loren Berwald.

Church school was started again on September 11, 1961. The Dorcas building at the

church site had been Grail District School near Keoghs, which was bought and moved. When the Henderson children needed church school, that building was moved again across the road from the Paul Henderson farm home and remodeled. The Suby house was bought and moved near for the teacher's house. School opened with nine pupils. The next year there were eleven. Raymond Weikum was the teacher. When he was called to Bismarck, his wife taught. In 1962, Merlin Chambers was the instructor. He became sick and Bertha Lovaas taught. Anna Peterson was substitute for two months. There were two Weikum children in school, Rocky, Lyleen, Herbert, James and Patsy Henderson, Roger Birdbear, and David, Doris and Dixie Ritchie.

Anna Petersen, one of the members taught school for forty years. She taught for eight years in public schools and thirty-two years in parochial Adventist schools. This has given her many children to love, although she has none of her own. During the years she boarded with the parents, the preschool children also shared her love. She used good psychology with preschool children too. She boarded with the Howard Bell family during the term she taught Liberty school in 1925 and 1926. They had a preschool girl who never allowed her to leave the supper table without a story-telling session. After a few stories she would say, "I will tell you a story about Jack O'Nery and now my story is begun: I'll tell you a story about his brother, and now my story is done." No amount of coaxing brought another story and soon the little girl would go about her play as soon as that story was told.

Former members who moved were: Josie Steiner Budd to Glendale, CA; Walter Mercer to Detroit Lakes, MI; Clive Mercer to Boulder, CO; Emmett Mercer to Gary, SD; Al and Julie Rikustad (David and Carol Ann) to Bozeman, MT; Lyle, Haziel, Lyleen and "Rocky" Henderson and other children to Gentry, AR; Floyd, Celia, Ellen and Nita Goss to Yuma, AZ; Judy and Linda Lovaas to Fargo, ND; Marlys Sivertson Jensen to Tecumsah, NE; Merlin and Lois Chambers to Lincoln, NE; Dan, Mary, Rosemary and Bobby Necker to Hamilton, MT; David, Donna, Doris, David, Jr. and Dixie Ritchie to South Dakota.

These died before we kept records: Leslie Van Allen at age 12 in 1924; Mathilda Peterson, year uncertain; Christ Peterson 1944; Viola Foreman in 1945.

Pearl Foreman Sivertson had much responsibility for years; on the church board, SS superintendent, secretary of different departments, treasurer, divisions, Dorcas, mission leader and Vacation Bible School. She has been unable to attend lately. Others we miss much are the Haugens, Dan, Wilson and Clarence; the Foremans, Nora, Earl, Vernon and Lenn.

It is such a small church nearly everyone fills an office. It is surprising what an ordinary mortal can do with God's help. Eight charter members are still here: Rose Peterson; Marie Haugen; Clarence Lovaas; Charles Mercer; Paul and Hazel Henderson; and Sally Foreman.

We are studying the architect's drawings for a new church in Watford City and have ambitions for a resident pastor to share with Grassy Butte. We hope to be able to have church in the basement before the year is out, by doing much of the labor to save on costs.

We are fortunate that the memory of Rose Henderson Peterson is keen and she has been able to fill us in on many names, events and dates of which we have no church records because we were not formally organized until lately.

This is the most sparsely populated but largest county in North Dakota. Here distances are long and work always hard. Members are still a long distance from one another.

Flag Mountain Camp Report

The directors, staff and volunteers were overwhelmed with the repairs which needed to be accomplished in the short time before Cub Camp begins June 17, 2020. The more they surveyed, the more they found. The more they cleaned, the more they found to clean. However, they tackled their Everest with prayer and a plan.





The cook stove, original to the camp in 1967 but having come prior to that from Sheyenne River Academy, is estimated to be 85 years old. It was spitting fire and replaced with a miraculously available refurbished 1990s circa propane stove with burners and grill that work. It is installed and operational. After much cleaning, it appears almost new.

A donated three-basin stainless sink has been installed. Waterproof board was mounted behind the sink and the plumbing for the entire kitchen was replaced as it was leaking, improperly installed and no longer up to code.

Ryan Peterson, vocational and maintenance assistant from Dakota Adventist Academy provided the knowledge, direction and skills necessary for much of what was done.

Trees that fell in the latest windstorm were logged by Ben Hobbs and Pastor Sam Thomas. The Steve Wilkins family and father-in-law, Chuck, who brought his mini excavator, were helpful in fixing the bridge, digging out and repairing leaking septic tanks.

"People are the biggest blessing," says Director and Pastor Brooke Melendez. "Sam, Steve, Pete and Gloria dug up water lines and fixed them. Alea and Chantelle replanted the lodge entry flower beds adding some organization to the color display.



And to add insult to injury there was an incident with a skunk.

Director Ricky Melendez says there will still need to be a work bee in September and they, Ricky and Brooke, have established a three-year recovery plan for the camp.
