



The Martin Adventist Church



The Martin Seventh-day Adventist Church had its beginning in the hamlet of Batesland, right on the boarder of the Pine Ridge Sioux Indian Reservation, when Elder R. F. Bresee and Arthur Andrus started a series of tent meetings on July 4, 1937. Soon some interest developed and when, night after night, the precious truths of God's word were

presented, honest hearts responded.

The first Sabbath School session on August 14, 1937, reported 36 present. With the sustained interest the need for a permanent church home was felt. Providentially the Presbyterian Mission Board had a church building for sale and so the edifice, which is still being used today (written in 1979), was bought for \$650.00.

The first baptism on October 31, 1937, resulted in a harvest of eight souls. A few weeks later, December 18, 1937, the Batesland church was organized with a charter membership of 16 persons. They were Elder and Mrs. R. F. Bresee, Harvard Bresee, Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Popplewell, Harold Popplewell, Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Cargill, Mr. and Mrs. George Popplewell, Earl and Frank Gabriel, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Popplewell, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Gabriel. The organizational meeting was led by Elder Bresee.

In January 1938 the women of the church met to organize a Dorcas Society. The lady members not only helped many needy people in the area but also raised money for new church seats and songbooks.

The church was dedicated free of debt the weekend of September 8 - 10, 1939, in the presence of Elder H. E. Oswald, president of the Northern Union and Elder A. V. Rhodes, president of the South Dakota Conference.

Through the years membership fluctuated as most of the early members moved away to other areas and others moved into the surrounding rural community to become members of the Batesland church. In 1953 some improvements were made in the church building by tiling and paneling the basement.

In 1961 a church school opened its doors with Alfred Bernhardt as the first teacher. During that same year new bathrooms were added to the facilities.

With the decline of the Batesland hamlet and the absence of any resident member in the same village, consideration was given to the proposal to move the church edifice to Martin, just 18 miles east of Batesland, along Highway 18. By locating the church in the center of Bennett County and in a much larger community, it was hoped that the church could grow again. Therefore, some property was purchased along the highway on the west side of Martin, next to the Lutheran church. Under the direction of pastor Max Singhurst the church building was moved from Batesland to Martin on November 19, 1973, after a new basement had been dug. The relocated building was then spruced up with new siding on the outside and wood paneling on the inside. The basement was converted into a fellowship room, which also doubles as a room for the children's

division.

The present pastor is Orville Poore, who with his wife Maybelle, moved to Martin during August 1978. Ray Gardiner is the local elder and the church has a present membership of 18. The prayer of the present congregation is the same as that of the charter members - that many souls may be added to this church and be a light set upon a hill in this community of 1250 souls. 1

Pastor Orville Poore and his wife Maybelle pastored the Martin church and the church at Pine Ridge for seven years.

The present pastor is Wilbur Mauk, who with his wife, Janice, and son Dwayne also direct the Seventh-day Adventist Mission church and school at Pine Ridge. 2

Students Walk to Help Relieve "A Long Walk to Water"



Every year the students of Prairie Voyager school in Grand Forks participate in a Walka-thon to raise money for a worthy cause. This year the students were walking to raise money to help drill a water well to improve the quality of life for a community in Central America.

The idea for this year's worthy cause came from the Grade 6 reading curriculum. Author Linda Sue Park's "A Long Walk to Water" tells the story of two children in Africa and how a water well changed their lives. This compelling story prompted Mrs. Erickson to start an ongoing challenge for the 2019-20 school year to raise money to help drill a water well in a foreign country. The school board voted to split the funds two ways, sending half of the money to ADRA and half to Water Ambassadors Canada, an international service organization that specializes in drilling water wells in impoverished areas.

Mrs. Erickson's brother, Phillip Buelow, a water well driller by trade, also believes in the

importance of clean drinking water for all people. Through Water Ambassadors Canada, Buelow will go to Guatemala in April of 2020 to be the lead driller in a well project. Using the funds gathered throughout the year and through sponsors for their walk-a-thon, Prairie Voyager was able to contribute to this mission project. In return, Buelow will report back to the school with pictures and a presentation so the students can see the fruits of their fundraising.

During the school year, a 5-gallon pail has been placed in the foyer of the church to collect coins and bills to go towards the water well fund. Before the walk-a-thon, the bucket had acquired about \$425. To increase the fund, the 10 students of Prairie Voyager used two hours during the afternoon of February 13 to walk the track at Choice Health and Fitness. Prior to walking, the students asked family and friends to sponsor them with by a flat rate or by so much per lap. 441 laps were walked (7 laps = 1 mile), with one student running 70 laps during the two hours on the track!

After the pledges came in, the account held about \$1090. A donation of \$543 was made through Water Ambassadors for Buelow's trip. The bucket will continue to collect funds for the remainder of the school year with a final donation to be made to ADRA.

Note: Due to the pandemic, Buelow's trip to Guatemala has been postponed. However, Prairie Voyager School has continued to receive funds and donations towards ADRA.



Somewhere during this process, Christina was giving Skid a complete hygienic overhaul: worms, lice, fleas, ear mites, the whole works. How it had even lived this long was a mystery. Within a couple days, he was literally trying to crawl out of his box. How he could even function with an incomplete skeleton is another mystery. But when God sets His mind to heal a critter, the details don't much matter.

After this, the healing came quickly and it happily adapted to its new home at the farm. Christina would sometimes take it to work with her for the novelty of it. Skid soon became the very picture of health and still is!
