
Excerpt from a Dakota Adventist girl's journal. Inscription on the inside cover reads:

Edna Moser Celebrates 100 Years

Edna E. Schindler was born August 30, 1920 to Fred and Lydia (Vietz) Schindler on the farm six or seven miles southeast of Denhoff, North Dakota, where her parents were living. Her parents moved several times before settling in Denhoff in 1933 when Edna was twelve. She was educated in rural schools and finished the eighth grade at Denhoff public school in 1934. The family increased in 1923 with the addition of sister Velda and sister Arliss in 1934. Edna had to stay at home to take care of Arliss while mother worked on sewing projects for the Works Progress Administration, a former American New Deal agency, and her father farmed.

Edna met Sam Moser in 1936 and they were married two years later on October 21 at the courthouse in McClusky. For Edna's wedding her mother bought her a teal blue dress at the local variety store. Sam and Edna made their home in Denhoff where she was a housewife and Sam worked for the railroad. They welcomed daughter Sharri in 1940. Four years later the family moved to Lodi, California where Edna harvested grapes and later worked for a laundry company and Sam worked as a carpenter. They moved back to Denhoff the next year and Sam farmed with his father-in-law until 1952 when the family moved to Bismarck where Sam worked as a carpenter and home builder. Edna was a homemaker during the early years, however, in 1957 she was employed at the governor's mansion where she baked and served food for governor's wife's women's lunches and teas until in 1958. A few years later Edna began to work for Dr. Heideman, D.O. in the business office as receptionist, scheduler and file clerk. When Dr. Heideman retired due to illness, Edna worked in the business office for Dr. Steven Lester, chiropractor, until she retired.

Born and raised in an Adventist home, Edna's church and church community have always been an important part of her life. During her youth, the children's magazine *Our Little Friend* provided the only activity in church. As an adult, Edna has served the Bismarck Seventh-day Adventist Church as clerk, deaconess and head deaconess for thirty plus years. A couple of years ago she turned down a request by the church selection committee to serve another term. She is, however, an honorary deaconess. She also recorded church attendance for over a decade.

In addition to daughter Sherri and Roger Jacobs, Edna has three grandchildren, seven great-grandchildren with one deceased, and three great-great-grandchildren.



This exceeded the young man's plea to God and he was more than happy to move to the Dakotas at the beginning of September.

Pastor Justin has joined Pastor Peter & Ella Simpson in the Edgeley / Cleveland / Jamestown / New Home district and is excited to be there. He would love to see real change in people's hearts and minds toward Jesus. He knows that once people understand who God is and why He matters, they can't help but share Him with others.
