

Nothing to Fear

This is the first installment of a multi-part series taken from the late Pastor Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear*: The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas, published in 1983.

FOREWORD: "LEST WE FORGET"

Experience cannot be inherited. The foolish bridesmaids of Matthew 25 learned this too late.

Furthermore, God has no grandchildren. That is, no one becomes a Christian except through commitment arising out of personal experience. No second-hand faith or borrowed religious experience for Christians.

But the Adventist experience is even more distinctive. Without it, the Seventh-day Adventist Church cannot be understood today. In 1896, Ellen White wrote about a "Brother T," who taught a mixture of truth and error. She had words of counsel: "If he had passed through the experience of God's people as He led them for the past forty years, he would be better prepared to make the correct application of Scripture. The great waymarks of truth, showing us our bearings in prophetic history, are to be carefully guarded, lest they be torn down, and replaced with theories that would bring confusion rather than genuine light." Selected Messages, Book 2, p. 101.

To help us remember the Adventist experience, especially as it was lived in the Dakotas, is the purpose of this book. What the author has done for Dakota should be done for all our conferences. What stories of valor and courage we would share!

The early hardships for Adventist in the Dakotas did not all arise out of bleak winters, parched fields, or hailstones in harvest. Changing a German's day of rest, or a Scandinavian's, is a formidable challenge. Especially was this true at the turn of the century. But the effort was worth it. God was gathering a people to meet the Lord.

And Dakota Adventists took this gospel assignment seriously.

They understood the importance of the events that transpired in the 1844 Movement. That experience guided their lives as light on a dark path. When companies of believers were separated by hundreds of miles and visiting preachers were few, those early Dakota Adventists knew that more than a human hand had brought them together. The Adventist experience gave them a sense of mission, compelling them to invite their neighbors to share the future with them.

For a Dakota Adventist today to understand fully the purpose and genius of the Adventist Church, he must relive in thought and spirit the story of his spiritual ancestors. And that will not happen without a knowledge of the history of his church.

Throughout the Bible, God repeatedly urges His people to "remember." "remember the days of old, consider the years of many generations." Deut.32:7. Remember what?. The mistakes and successes of previous generations. The evidences of God's hand in leading His people. The consciousness of being a special people with a special mission for a special time.

Never in our history has a knowledge of the Adventist past been more needed than today. Our spiritual fathers and mothers were not biblical nitwits. Hardly! The Adventist theological root system will still bear the test of scrutiny; it has never been more relevant.

But the devil will be at war with the church, as he sees the end approaching. Temptations to compromise, to believe his deceptions, will become increasingly severe.

This monumental volume will help all of us to profit by these words: "We have nothing to fear for the future, except as we shall forget the way the Lord has led us, and His teaching in our past history." -- Life Sketches, p.196.
