

Service, mission, community, involvement, values, morality, ethics, honesty, compassion, industry, creativity, integrity, faithfulness, perseverance, graciousness – these are more than words. They are the cornerstone of society and are best expressed when based upon a Biblical worldview. As a parent, that is what I wanted to pass to my children and I was very thankful for those Christian teachers who reinforced the same values.

One day, I will stand before my Maker. I want to hear those wonderful words, "Well done! Enter into the joy of the Lord!" This is the Higher Ed I desire for myself, and for all of our students across our conference.



Mosheh Crist, an eighth grader this year, has been at Invitation Hill Adventist School since fourth grade. His mom, Danell, is a postal carrier and in the summer of 2016 was delivering mail in the school neighborhood (then in the basement of the church). She noticed a banner on the fence of the church/school yard stating that applications for registration were being accepted. Not having met the teacher or knowing much about Adventism, Danell went into the building and enrolled Mosheh on the spot. He was having a bad experience in public school, and she felt this would be a good place for him.


Mosheh has a curious mind, and shortly after beginning school noticed some interesting magazines in the foyer that talked about the mark of the beast and other topics that piqued his interest. He began attending church with the teacher and her husband each week. His mom worked most Saturdays but came when she could. Over the years, Mosheh's little brother and sister began attending church weekly as well. Last summer, Danell began asking questions about the Bible and expressing more interest in things of a spiritual nature. The teacher and her husband studied with the family a few times in their home, and last fall when the church hosted an online evangelistic series, Danell attended almost every meeting. By the end of the series, she had developed a growing desire to commit her life more fully to Christ and was convicted that she should not work on the Sabbath anymore. She spoke to her supervisor, and while he sympathized, he said he couldn't allow her to have Saturdays off. She worked one more Sabbath, and then said, "I can't work another Sabbath." And she hasn't. Our class and our church began lifting this matter up in prayer daily. She has expected her employment to end, but even though she has been written up a few times for calling in on Sabbaths, her employment continues. It has presented hardships as many weeks she has a paycheck that reflects only four days of work. As a single mom, this takes a lot of faith. She is inspiring many in our church family, our students, and a wider circle as her story is being shared, and people from many states are praying for her. Her living testimony is shining a light and creating a legacy that will have ripples into eternity.

To all those who support Adventist Christian education with your prayers and pocketbooks: thank you so much. You are making a difference for eternity—not just in the lives of the students, but in their families' lives as well. Please continue to pray for the teachers as leaders of this evangelistic effort, and for the Holy Spirit to touch the hearts of our students

to make a decision for Christ while they are young.

Prairie Voyager Adventist Elementary

Grand Forks, North Dakota

Recently, the Grade 1-4 Social Studies class began a unit study about the cultures of North America. Students read informational texts and completed worksheets about Canada, the United States, Mexico, and Caribbean. Part of the information gathered concerned the native and popular cuisines of each country and how those foods have contributed to their respective cultures. To finish the unit, all five students came to Mrs. Erickson's home to make and taste some of those North American cultural cuisines.

Our culinary travels began in the United States, featuring it as a melting pot of different cultures. Basic ingredients were combined to make dough for Native American fry bread, which was later fried in oil to produce its puffed-up finished form. Spaghetti is a popular food in America and students were coached in making homemade noodles by mixing eggs into a well of flour on a flat countertop. After the dough had rested, students ran it through a pasta sheeter and a spaghetti cutter, followed by the cooking of the noodles. Some short cuts were taken, and not all food was prepared by the students.

Canada is Mrs. Erickson's birth country and it was easy for her to choose which foods would be featured to represent the culture. Her favorite food, poutine (French-fried potatoes smothered in gravy and cheese curds) was an obvious choice for inclusion despite its heart-attack-inducing appearances. For dessert, the class enjoyed Nanaimo bars. This confection includes layers of coconut, graham crackers, cocoa, and creamy custard, topped off with chocolate.

The culinary adventure into Mexico was presented by Ricky Melendez, Conference Youth Director. Ricky was able to share his cultural heritage, including music, language, holidays, and cuisine. At our cultural celebration, students prepared homemade tortillas which included mixing the dough, flattening the balls in a tortilla press, and cooking them on a griddle. Three Mexican beverages were also enjoyed: hibiscus juice, tamarind soda, and a mandarin soda. Some of the students were brave enough to try a Mexican mango sucker that is coated in tamarind and chili powder.

For our final destination of the Caribbean, students helped prepare Puerto Rican tostones, which are slices of fried plantain that have marinated in a salt water- lime - garlic solution. Cuban black beans and rice were also part of the meal.

To finish our celebration, we ventured out into the backyard of Mrs. Erickson's home, where a Mexican Piñata was hanging from a tree branch. Students enjoyed hitting the piñata until the explosion of candy rained down on them!

Part of Mrs. Erickson's personal philosophy of teaching is to "go beyond the books". Not all lessons can be turned into an experience; but, when possible, she believes a higher level of learning is obtained when lessons bring in multiple facets of information. While not all of the foods presented were enjoyed by the students, the experience was fun and educational.

project, and we hope to participate again next year.














Charting a Higher Course


