

### **Nothing to Fear**

This is the twenty-fourth installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear: The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas*, published in 1983.

#### CHAPTER 7: To the Lord be all the Praise - Part 4

New churches organized, or at least initially reported in 1886 include: Brookings, Spring Lake, Clark, Lake Byron - where a church of thirteen was organized following tent meetings on the shore of the lake, Ellsworth (Clark County), Lakeside (maybe another name for the Lake Byron church), and Hartford (Minnehaha County).<sup>33</sup>

W.B. White also reported from Webster (Day County), where brethren Chaffee and Newcombe are holding a tent meeting, "that he anticipated the organization of a church at that place also." <sup>34</sup>

In addition, evangelistic work was done at DeSmet (Kingsbury County) by G.H. Smith, M.M. Ruiter, A.H. Smith, S.E. Andrews, and N. Gilbert; at Roslyn (Day County), where a group of Sabbath-keepers already existed; by Marcus Stremann and J.C. Mikkelsen; at Taopi (Minnehaha County) by George Smith and C.P. Frederickson, and at Arlington (Kingsbury County) where George Smith and M.M. Ruiter found excellent interest during their brief evangelistic series. "Twelve, all heads of families," reported Smith, "have signed the covenant... and last night seven or eight more signified their intention to obey God." <sup>35</sup>

Near the end of 1886, the city mission was moved from Huron to Mitchell in preparation for the following year's camp meeting.<sup>36</sup>

By March of 1887, A.D. Olsen reported that "six have begun to keep the Sabbath, and others are on the point of decision" as a result of the efforts of the city mission workers at Mitchell. Continuing follow-up at Huron, noted Olsen, had resulted in a similar number of converts. The Huron church with a charter membership of ten was organized later that same month.<sup>37</sup>

Evangelist George H. Smith had a productive year in 1887, organizing churches at Watertown, where tent

meetings more than a year earlier had resulted in the formation of a small Sabbath School, and at Cresbard (Faulk County), near Northville, where several people had become Sabbath-keepers as a result of literature and visits from lay members of "T and M" Societies.<sup>38</sup>

Smith also worked at Helmick (Hand County) breathing new life into a discouraged company that had discontinued regular meetings, continued his earlier work at Arlington, finding several new converts and organizing a tract society of nine members, followed up interest generated by literature evangelists at Aberdeen (Brown County) where four persons "began to observe the Sabbath", and visited scattered believers at Bushnell (Brookings County).<sup>39</sup>

Camp meeting at Mitchell was attended by about 450 Dakota Adventists, some of whom traveled up to 200 miles by horse and wagon in order to catch trains to Mitchell hundreds of miles further.<sup>40</sup>

At the conference session held in connection with camp meeting, the church at Rapid City (Pennington County) in the Black Hills was admitted to the conference and a resolution was passed to "send a minister with his family to the Black Hills, to build up and strengthen the work already begun there, and, if possible, send one or two Bible Workers with him."

The minister chosen for this assignment was the successful evangelist George Smith who arrived at Rapid City on July 19, visited places where B.J. Cady had worked in the spring (possibly resulting in the organization of the Rapid City church), and pitched his tent at Spearfish (Lawrence County). "The people here are very worldly, being ranchers, miners, etc.," reported Smith. "The various churches have nearly failed thus far to sustain weekly meetings... Our congregations more than double the Methodists' when held at the same hour. Most of the people acknowledge we have the truth, but the cross is too heavy. Sunday here is about as busy a day as any. Stores are open most all day. The decrees of the Council of Laodicea of A.D. 364 (legislating the observance of Sunday) are not enforced here." A Sabbath School of ten members was organized at Spearfish and a "T and M" Society was formed for the Black Hills District. 42

Late in 1887, Smith reported working at Rockerville, Spring Creek and Minche's school house (probably all Pennington County) in the vicinity of Rapid City, but poor health forced him to return to Sioux Falls at the end of January, 1888, for medical treatment.<sup>43</sup>

Sickness could not stop the determined evangelist however; Smith held services at the Cresbard church even though he had to do some of his preaching while seated, due to weakness. During March Smith preached a series of sermons at St. Lawrence (Hand County), possibly in the Helmick area where he had revived a discouraged congregation a year earlier. A church of seventeen members was organized.<sup>44</sup>

In the fall Smith teamed up with C.P. Frederickson to conduct tent meetings at Taopi. Near the end of September Smith and Frederickson reported that "there are now about 26 here keeping the commandments of God", with 35 attending Sabbath School. By early 1889 this number had grown to 46 and the group had erected a church building. Although specific documentation is lacking, it seems likely that Taopi subsequently became an organized church.<sup>45</sup>

Two other evangelistic teams were also active in 1888. L.H. Ells worked at Grand Meadow (Minnehaha County) in April, succeeding in organizing of Sabbath School of nineteen members (report by George Smith from Taopi in

August mentions a visit to his meetings by members of the Grand Meadow "church"), and at Revillo (Grant County) in August, apparently raising up a group of about twelve new believers. In both of these locations, reported Ells, prior work by literature evangelists had helped generate interest for his evangelistic endeavors.<sup>46</sup>

In the meantime, C.M. Chaffee and J.W. Newcombe preached to crowds numbering up to 250 of the 800 inhabitants of the town of Webster where the two evangelists had conducted a similar tent effort two years earlier. <sup>47</sup>

Of the 632 Adventists in South Dakota in 1888, 568 attended camp meeting in late June at Sioux Falls where, apparently, the city mission had been relocated. Attendance from the city and surrounding countryside was also excellent; about 3,000 people crowded the tent on Sunday.<sup>48</sup>

I learned through my teaching career that a career given to God takes you on more adventures than a life controlled by oneself. From my very first job out of college, I learned God has both a plan and a sense of humor. Well, wouldn't you know it, my first job out of college took me to California where I taught at Armona Union Academy and had the best year of my life. From there I taught at several other schools, but always in large school settings teaching fifth and sixth grades with 20-32 students in a class. They LOVE to learn and are always so excited to ask questions and try new things.

I think all good teachers love to learn and it is this passion they wish to share with others. However, after the past couple years of crazy stuff going on in the country and communities, I think we all have felt overloaded. God knew this passion needed to be relit in me and knew exactly how to do it. If I had chased what I thought I needed I would never have had the honor to teach these students and be reminded daily about the passion for learning and how it needs to be passed on.
