

I believe that built into the heart of every person is the desire to fit in somewhere. God created us as social beings with a yearning to connect with others in meaningful ways. Is there a place God designed where people of all circumstances and situations can connect with one another? I believe there is - that place is the church.

I am a firm believer in the importance of the local church. As I travel around our conference and interact with various church families I attempt to reiterate the same message every time – the most important part of the Dakota Conference is the church family. It is within the context of this family where friendships are established, where meaningful service can happen, where encouragement can be found, and where the sense of being a part of something significant and life-changing occurs. I am a firm believer in the importance of the local church.

But, why? Why should anyone bother to be a part of a local church? Why should we get up on Sabbath morning when we are tired? Why should we go through the motions of appearing happy when we may not appreciate all that is going on? Why should we subject ourselves to people who sometimes say and do hurtful things? Why? Simple, because I can still be a blessing to others.

Wait a minute, you may say. I have needs. I have wishes. I have preferences. I want things done a certain way. I want to sing the music I like. I want to be done by noon. I want... Have you noticed a certain word being used a lot? That word is "I". Belonging isn't just about me; it is about being a part of something bigger than me and being open to what God may want me to see or experience differently. So, what does this have to do with belonging?

Years ago, a popular catchphrase was the ME generation. I don't hear that expression used much anymore, but the idea is still very prevalent. Being a Christian is not about me. It is about being a part of the body of Christ and therefore, all believers belong to one another. We have the privilege and responsibility of ministering to one another.

There are at least fourteen times we are instructed to "love one another" in the New Testament. Loving each other should be one of the defining characteristics of the church. I realize that it can be very hard at times to love some of the saints. I realize that when you don't feel warmth extended your way it can be hard to continue on.

An elder in one of my former congregations was upset about ideas I had regarding the church. One night at a board meeting he stood up and publicly resigned as he was walking out the door. For over a year he would still come to church, intentionally exit out the door where I was greeting people, pause while I extended my hand to greet him, look at me and my outstretched hand, and then proceed to walk on past. It did not feel good. But how I felt was secondary to the fact that I was called to love him. Period.

In addition to the call to "love one another" there are many other "one another" phrases we find in the New Testament. Encourage one another, bear one another's burdens, care for one another, and so on. This tells me that the purpose of the church is about the other person, not me. It is about the community of believers, not me. It is about growing and serving together, not me. It is about what we can give, not what we can get. Our example is Jesus. In spite of the challenges He faced, it was His habit to meet on Sabbath with the people of God, even as some of them were plotting how to kill Him. He came to serve and share, and He did that as a part of a community.

Belonging. It implies commitment. It indicates a group I trust in. It is a body of people who assists when I am in need and provides a place where I can help others when they are in need. That is what the church was meant to be.

Calling the Called

"...He called you out of the darkness into His wonderful light." - 2 Peter 2:9, NLT

One of the greatest gifts that God gave us in this world is His Church. You may have not ever thought of the church being so valuable but somewhere along the Christian journey we all come to realize how fortunate we are to have the church in our lives.

The Biblical Greek word we translate as "church" is *ekklesia*. It's a dynamic word that contains great potential for helping us rediscover God's purpose for us. Locked inside this term is the DNA of how the church ought to be viewed by believers.

Actually, ekklesia doesn't exactly mean "church." After the Church was launched in power on the day of Pentecost, the first believers didn't create a new term to describe who they were. They rather borrowed an existing term from the common vernacular, already invested with meaning and understanding. Ekklesia means "assembly" or "gathering" or "congregation". The word refers to a body of people, not to a building. Interestingly, our English word for church is derived from the German "kirche", which generally refers to the building itself. Do you see the difference? One is a place and the other is people. One is brick and mortar and the other is flesh and blood. For a disciple of Jesus Christ, the church is not a place you go to but it's something you are. You don't go to church; you are the church. The Church is inseparably linked to Christ Himself. As a matter of fact, Jesus spoke of the church as His own body. If you want to get rid of the church, you also need to get rid of Jesus. You can't have one without the other. To imagine that our Lord thinks of His people in this way is awe inspiring and transformational.

The idea of the church being made up of imperfect persons often causes discouragement. But rather than making us despair, the fact that Jesus started the church with imperfect, broken people should make us marvel at God's incredible grace. He's proud of how His grace is beating through your imperfect-but-redeemed life and through the church (have you ever read Ephesians 3: 10-11?).

Some believe that the organized church is not important, that being a mere believer without being tied to the church is what counts. However, the early church did indeed gather – and gathering together implies and always leads to some form of organizing. To pretend that the church doesn't need to be organized is like arguing that society doesn't need to be organized. Because community is inevitable, organization is inevitable. Hence the church is a visible, organized, structured entity that God gave us. We are admonished from the pen of inspiration: "As we near the final crisis, instead of feeling that there is less need of order and harmony of action, we should be more systematic than heretofore. All our work should be conducted according to well-defined plans" (Selected Messages, vol. 3, p. 26).


So back to the definition of the essence of God's church or ekklesia. It is clearly a part of God's design for how we should interact while we're on this planet. It has a special place in our lives as we journey to the

Kingdom of Heaven. Come to think of it, Heaven is a community too. The only one who wants us to believe that we are better off alone is our enemy. If you really think about it, it's actually a very clever tactic. The DNA of the church is discipleship (being called) and mission (called out) in the context of community (ones). In discipleship, Jesus and the Holy Spirit lead us to the heart of the Father. In mission, the heart of the Father sends us out in the power of the Spirit and the love of Jesus.

Both must happen together in community. We need them intertwined and crossing together, like a double helix bound by beads of community. Are you a member of His Church? Do you fulfill your responsibilities faithfully? Can His Church count on your support? Do you make use of all the opportunities the church affords you to grow in your walk with Christ? Let us determine to fulfill our calling where God has placed us. Let us keep our eyes on our Captain of salvation (Hebrews 2:10), who will take us safely into the harbor of protection when He comes to take us on a celestial flight to the Kingdom of glory.

Treasurer's Report



As opposed to general tithes (where a percentage goes to higher level organizations), Dakota Challenge is a monthly offering where all donations are used for conference-specific outreaches. These include Dakota Adventist Academy (45%), Evangelism (20%), Elementary Education (15%), Youth Camps (10%), Dakota Native Ministries (5%), and Dakota Cemeteries (5%). Dakota Challenge donations have averaged \$128,500 annually over the last three years, though we have seen an unfortunate declining trend.

As many of you are aware, demographic changes in the Dakotas are affecting church membership of all denominations. As the "greatest generation" passes, younger people move into our region but they more frequently do not replace their parents or grandparents in church attendance. This trend has, and will, affect giving in our conference. In essence, the church operates, in some ways, above the tithe – which makes Dakota Challenge a "home directed" category that is much more crucial moving forward in promoting our Dakota mission outreaches. So when the next Sabbath offering you hear is for Dakota Challenge, please remember to give generously!

At a recent seminar on financial planning I attended, I learned something very important about Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs). The presenter's counsel was to convert your Traditional IRAs to Roth IRAs as soon as you can. His reasoning is this: Tax rates are lower now than they have been in decades and there is no



reason to believe they are ever going to be lower, but every reason to believe they are going to be higher, probably much higher. By converting your Traditional IRAs to Roth IRAs now, you will be paying much less in taxes. Once the conversion is made, and the taxes are paid on your Roth IRA, you never pay taxes on those Roth IRA funds again as they are not taxed when withdrawn during retirement. This is not true for funds withdrawn in retirement from Traditional IRAs as they are taxed at the tax rates in place at the time they are withdrawn. I encourage you to consult with your financial planner to determine if this is the best strategy for you.

Answers to Perceptions, Pt. 1 - Academy Mark R. Weir, President Spirituality

Last spring the office promoted a questionnaire to learn our church family's thoughts regarding Dakota Adventist Academy, our Conference school. Over 3,000 people were given the opportunity to express their perceptions. While I wish we had received a 100% response rate, be assured we are processing the information we did receive and are evaluating it carefully.

DAA has served our conference families for many decades. Though I am not a DAA graduate, I am a firm believer in the value of Adventist Education. I am not ignorant or unaware that there are those in our midst who feel differently, but I believe we have something of value to offer. I spent part of my career in an academy setting and I fully recognize that there are issues to be addressed. What does that make me? An advocate for our Academy, as well as a person with a pragmatic streak and a desire to be realistic.

Over the course of the next several months I will endeavor to share responses to the most pressing issues that came from the survey. I realize that I will be sharing my perceptions, in an attempt to address the perceptions contained in the survey - and "perception" is the key word. Most of the survey respondents did not have firsthand knowledge of current happenings at the school. While the perception is still valuable and worth considering, it did indicate that we need to do a much better job of communicating the many good things taking place at DAA.

We recently polled students and their parents from the past five years where we found that over 95% of the responses were positive. Yet many families completing the office's perceptions survey seem to have a much different perspective. Let me briefly begin to address one - spirituality on campus.

Spirituality is often a difficult subject to define. What promotes a spiritual atmosphere? Worship in the dorm? Service activities? In my decade as an academy chaplain, the biggest factor were the students themselves, particularly the seniors. Strong, courageous, confident disciples of Christ dramatically impacted the spiritual tone of the school. If there were a number of these spiritual leaders in the senior class, the year was much more positive. Without them, a different tone was set.

While faculty and staff play a key role, they must work within the confines of the students' current level of growth and spiritual development. To promote growth, a pastor has joined the staff this year to serve as upper grades' Bible teacher and school chaplain. I realize this is only one small part of the spirituality equation, but it is an important part.

We ask that you keep the Academy in your prayers as we address the perceptions and concerns of our Dakota Conference family.
