

Nothing to Fear

This is the twenty-ninth installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear:* The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas, published in 1983.

CHAPTER 8: To Effect An Organization - Part 3

On June 24, 1902, at 6:00 p.m., "the brethren and sisters assembled in camp at Carrington, North Dakota, proceeded to effect an organization." ¹⁵

General Conference representative S.H. Lane described the 1902 Carrington gathering as "an old-fashioned camp meeting, such as we used to have thirty years ago." Although no doubt the attendance by English-speaking and Scandinavian members was reduced by the forthcoming camp meetings to be held at Arvilla and Minot, the composition of the Carrington gathering, 250 Germans, 75 English-speaking people, and 25 Scandinavians, was a clear reflection of the rapidly developing work among the German-Russians. 11

The new conference chose Fargo as its headquarters because of its superior railroad connections and because of the likelihood that the Northern Union Conference (recently formed from part of the Northwestern Union) would locate its headquarters there also.¹⁸

Education was high on the priority list of the delegates to this conference session; resolutions were passed suggesting that people moving into the state locate near groups of isolated believers for the purpose of starting Sabbath Schools and church schools; that training institutes in Sabbath School, church and missionary work be conducted; that youth be encouraged to take at least some secondary training; and that a fund be established "for the erection and maintenance of Intermediate and Industrial Schools." 19

Financial matters received considerable attention, and a "Six Thousand Dollar Fund" was established. This fund was a kind of Conference-level combined budget in which fifty percent of all money received was to go for a "Depository and Reserve Fund" for a Tract Society and possible conference headquarters building, and the other half was to be divided equally among the Tent, Canvassers, Educational, Relief, Tract, and Foreign Mission

Putting the needs of the new conference before the people in more concrete terms, repeated appeals for funds for the various programs were made, and the people responded liberally. "The meetings at which the money was raised," reported S.H. Lane, "were among the best of the entire series. The leaders simply stated what they desired, and the blessing of the Lord seemed to accomplish the rest; and as the brethren and sisters pledged, they bore testimony to their love of the truth and their willingness to help it. Several Germans were present who had been imprisoned in Russia, and they said, with hearts filled with gratitude, that while they had filled sentences in the Old World for the truth's sake, they were indeed glad that they now had their liberty that they might earn money to aid the Lord's cause. Including what was given to the Sabbath School, the foreign missions work, etc., five thousand dollars was pledged and paid in cash by the three hundred and fifty people who were encamped. The German brethren seemed to vie with one another in helping the work, and many acres of wheat and flax are growing in North Dakota to aid the Missionary Acre Fund."²¹

The organizational structure adopted in the conference constitution and bylaws consisted of a president and a vice-president, a secretary, a treasurer (whose duties were more or less limited to the internal financial affairs of the church) and a business agent who took care of the external business dealings of the church, such as purchasing, care of church property, business matters in connection with camp meetings, etc.


There were only two departments, Educational, which had jurisdiction over both Sabbath Schools and church schools, and the Missionary Department, responsible for lay missionary work, youth work, and the work of the literature evangelists.²²

The Promise

For the Christian, the true meaning of Christmas is understood as a promise coming to fruition. What was the promise? That God, through His Son, would restore to mankind their lost innocence; restore in us God's own image (Gen. 1:26). Wrote Paul, "For as by the one man's disobedience [Adam's] the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience [Christ's] the many will be made righteous" (Rm. 5:19).

God told Adam and Eve that Satan's attempt to rule this world would not go unchallenged (Gen. 3:15). And so, the day the Majesty of Heaven was born in a stable marked the beginning of the fulfillment of the promise. Later, the infant child, now a man, highlighted the conflict with the adversary saying, "Do not suppose that I have come to bring peace to the earth. I did not come to bring peace, but a sword" (Matt. 10:34).

Satan thought to completely eradicate the image of God in men through his lies, deceit and trickery. But Jesus, when challenged said, "The kingdom of God is not coming in ways that can be observed, nor will they say, 'Look, here it is!' or 'There!' for behold, the kingdom of God is in the midst of you" (Lk. 17:21). This is seen every time we, in sincerity, repeat the Lord's Prayer. When we pray, "Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth as it is in Heaven" (Matt. 6:10), we are reassured of the eventual overthrow of the enemy.

Later, with that appointed time in mind, and His crucifixion near, Jesus said, "Now is the judgment of this world; now will the ruler of this world be cast out…" (Jn. 12:31). His victory on the Cross sealed the fate of all God's enemy's.

As we celebrate the birth of the Child "destined to cause the falling and rising of many" (Lk. 2:34), let's not forget to take in the whole understanding of Jesus' coming. The promise fulfilled by God to send His Son the first time paved the way for His second coming, the promise to "come back and to take you to be with Me that you also may be where I am" (Jn. 14:3). For He was "Born to raise the sons of earth; born to give them second birth…"

Mats for the Homeless

The members of the National Honor Society at Dakota Adventist Academy have teamed up with the Bismarck Adventist church to crochet sleeping mats for the homeless. Plastic grocery bags are collected and then made into "plarn" or plastic yarn. Plarn is made by cutting stacks of plastic bags into strips and then looping them together into long strands. The strands are then wound into large balls, ready to be used to make the plastic

mats. It takes 700-800 plastic bags to make one mat! More plastic bags are needed and can be dropped off at Dakota Adventist Academy or at the Bismarck Adventist church. NHS students are having fun learning a new skill and at the same time, helping the homeless.
