

## **Nothing to Fear**

This is the twenty-ninth installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear:* The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas, published in 1983.

#### **CHAPTER 8: To Effect An Organization - Part 4**

The first officers of the North Dakota Conference were: President, John G. Walker; Vice-President, Lars Nielson; Treasurer, Mrs. Alice H. Robinson; Secretary, A.E. Christian; Business Agent, Charles Leer; Educational Field Secretary, F. G. Specht; Missionary Field Secretary, C.H. Staples.<sup>23</sup>

A partial report of the Committee on Credentials and Licenses only lists three ordained ministers: Valentine Leer, Lars Nielson, and A.E. Christian. Ministerial licenses were granted to Conference President John Walker and to Educational Field Secretary F.G. Specht. There may have been others in either or both categories, as a later report of this committee authorizes the Conference Committee to consider "all other applications."<sup>24</sup>

Not much is known of these first North Dakota Conference officials prior to their election in 1902. The scanty records do indicate that most of them had worked for several years in either North or South Dakota.<sup>25</sup>

North Dakota's first president, John G. Walker, was a Canadian, born in Lincoln, Ontario, in 1862. He had served as Secretary-Treasurer of the Dakota Conference and Tract Society, as Missionary Field Secretary, and as Dakota Conference Vice President before being elected North Dakota's first president. Though a relatively young man (40) and without many years of ministerial experience (indicated by the fact that he was elected president prior to his ordination), his leadership qualities and sound business sense must have been evident to inspire the confidence of the workers and constituents of two conferences.<sup>26</sup>

Laymen were encouraged to supplement the small ministerial force, particularly by gaining experience first as literature evangelists. According to S.H. Lane's account, the colporteur work was so successful that most of the current colporteurs were specializing in the larger, more expensive volumes because of an abundance of money.<sup>27</sup>

Lane also warned the multi-ethnic believers not to allow "class feelings" to come in, but to recognize "that all-both German and English--should realize that we are all one in Christ Jesus." 28

Sometime after this organizational session, the *North Dakota Gleaner*, a conference news sheet, issued in both English and German (under the name *Sammler*) began to be published and continued until the *Northern Union Reaper* was first issued in 1906.<sup>29</sup> Perhaps this is why reports from North Dakota virtually disappear from the columns of the *Review and Herald*, as the workers began to report primarily to their local publication. I have been unable to locate any surviving copies of the *North Dakota Gleaner* or *Sammler*, so reports of these early years of the North Dakota Conference are unusually sketchy. Reports of the German work are even more scarce, possibly due to the existence of the *Hausfreund* (later called the *Arbeiter*?), a German language periodical apparently roughly equivalent to the *Advent Review and Sabbath Herald*.<sup>30</sup>

Just two months after camp meeting at Carrington, Vice-President Lars Nielson organized a "society" with two families at Stanley (Montrail County), the Nathaniel Wards and George Fowlers. A 1906 report in the *Northern Union Reaper* talks of electing an elder and a deacon "thus completing the organization of the Stanley Church." But entries in an early clerk's record book speak of taking the Ward and Fowler families into the church by letter (November 1, 1902); of a talk on church organization by Elder Nielson (June 3, 1903); and the election of officers, including elder and deacon-an almost certain indication of organization, according to the prevailing practice (May 21, 1904).<sup>31</sup>

In any event, the Stanley church was a family affair for its first few years, Nathaniel and Lois Ward's son, Charles marrying Mary S. Fowler after her husband's death and the other two sons, George and Frank, marrying Mary S.'s two daughters, H. Mabel and Mary M. Mary S.'s son, George Fowler, then married Ward's granddaughter Hattie. If you can get all that straight, the discrepancy in organization dates should prove no problem.

Although specific documentary evidence has not been found, it seems likely that work conducted around Stanley, and at Minot, where a Scandinavian camp meeting was conducted in 1902, combined with the influence of the nearby church at Kenmare, resulted in the organization of a church at Mohall before the first anniversary session of the North Dakota Conference in 1903.<sup>32</sup>
