

Nothing to Fear

This is the twenty-ninth installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear:* The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas, published in 1983.

CHAPTER 8: To Effect An Organization - Part 5

The third church organized during that first year of the new conference, I am speculating, was the Antelope church, truly a mystery church in many ways. The first time the Antelope church turns up in contemporary records is at the 1906 conference session, where it was officially disbanded.³³

Even the location of the Antelope church is uncertain. The only North Dakota town of Antelope is the one on the railroad right-of-way in Stark County. If this was the location, Antelope may well have been a charter church, the only one west of the Missouri River, the probable result of earlier work at Gladstone and Richardton.³⁴

Records dating to the mid-to-late 1920's indicate, however, that there was an Antelope Township in Wells County in the area of Bowdon.³⁵ The scanty evidence we have regarding the disbanding of the Antelope church lends some credence to the latter site.

The minutes of the 1906 Conference Session that disbanded the Antelope church speak of the "remaining members in good standing" and begin to explain the reason for the disbanding, an explanation which is crossed out and never completed in that record book.³⁶

If there was an Antelope church near Bowdon at the turn of the century, and if we are correct in reading between the lines that the church was disbanded due to internal problems rather than the departure of its members for greener fields, we may have in the case of the Antelope church, the only remaining trace of the activities of the Holbenslabon apostasy in North Dakota.

Holbenslabon, apparently a very persuasive individual with definite charismatic leanings, appears to have gained a substantial following among the German Adventist churches of North and South Dakota about the turn of the century.

His influence can be documented in the Bowdon area, where his highly emotional preaching and charismatic phenomena, with emphasis on the gift of healing, got some of the members so worked up, according to one account, that they had to be carried from the meeting, their bodies "stiff as boards."

If there was an Antelope church in this area, perhaps it could have been so influenced by Holbenslabon that an internal split led to its demise by 1906.

Beyond his emotional, charismatic emphasis, little can be discerned about Holbenslabon and his activities. One account indicates that he was a Sunday-keeper, which, if accurate, makes doubly remarkable his influence on the staunchly Adventist, German churches. Apparently one main thrust of his teachings was that people should withdraw their support from the church, both morally and financially, and give it to him.

The fruitage of Holbenslabon's work was most frequently fanaticism, especially in South Dakota where two of his followers proclaimed themselves the God of Jacob and the God of David and became the leaders of bitterly rival factions. One account indicates that Holbenslabon's followers around Eureka, South Dakota formed the core of the strong pocket of Church of God (Seventh-day) influence that exists in that area today.


After some activity in Montana and Canada, the movement died out in obscurity; Holbenslabon himself committed suicide.³⁷

Although the Wells County site seems most likely to be the location of the Antelope church, a 1910 report by J.J. Reiswig from Glen Ullin in Morton County, not very distant from the Stark County Antelope, mentions a group of people (apparently Germans) who had not been "fully in harmony with the message since the Holbenslabon movement." This could indicate that there was a charter church named Antelope west of the Missouri after all.


Brentwood Elementary School Upcoming Events


McClusky church members are happy that they can provide a space in a time of need. Even with small numbers they are committed to contributing to their community when an opportunity arises.
