

Nothing to Fear

This is the twenty-ninth installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear: The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas*, published in 1983.

CHAPTER 8: To Effect An Organization - Part 6

Camp meeting at Carrington in 1903 proved to be a monumental occasion in the history of North Dakota. A host of big Adventist names attended, including former and future General Conference presidents, George Butler and W. A. Spicer; Stephen N. Haskell, originator of the Tract and Missionary work; F. H. Westphal, pioneer missionary to South America; and Northern Union President C. W. Flaiz. The committee on plans and recommendations submitted a report on June 26, 1903, urging the conference to take immediate steps to establish an intermediate school in North Dakota. Voting privileges were extended to all in attendance at the camp meeting who then voted unanimously to approve the recommendation. It little more than a year, the Harvey Industrial School was opened, and shortly thereafter, renamed Sheyenne River Academy. A later chapter will deal with the history of North Dakota's academy in greater detail.

Conference President John Walker, who was ordained and re-elected at this 1903 session, reported to the delegates that during the conference's first year existence the membership had increased to 700, that Sabbath Schools had been conducted in thirty-one locations, and church schools at three, plus one "family school." Walker also reported that twelve literature evangelists had sold \$4,454.81 worth of books and papers.⁴⁰

At this session, steps were taken to legally incorporate, thus forming the North Dakota Conference Association, to hold conference property such as the Harvey Industrial School and the Fargo church (most of the early church buildings were owned by individuals or groups of members; many were later deeded over to the conference association.)⁴¹

The conference was divided into seven districts under the leadership of qualified laymen; they were given the responsibility for the care of the churches, freeing the ministerial force as much as possible for evangelistic work in new areas.

There are no records of the boundaries of these districts, but based on known locations of individuals in charge of the districts and a few other clues, it seems that District No. 1 included the northeastern portion of the state from the Canadian border to, probably, Grand Forks, and as far west as Rolette, perhaps Bottineau, County. District No. 2 apparently included areas west of District No.1 and as far south as the Missouri River. District No. 3 was divided into two parts by the Denhoff branch of the Northern Pacific Railroad and included the central part of the state where the German work was centered. District No. 4 was probably the east central part of the state between Grand Forks and Fargo and probably as far west as Jamestown. District No. 5 was probably the southwestern corner of the state, No. 6 the south-central, probably from Edgeley to the Missouri, and No. 7 the vast areas west and south of the Missouri.⁴²

District No. 1 received a large share of the evangelistic attention during the new conference's first few years. By 1905, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Graham and Mr. E. Chase, isolated believers at Saginaw near Rocklake (Towner County) had stirred up considerable interest in the area by the use of literature and Bible studies. Elder A.E. Christian followed up the interest with six weeks of evangelistic meetings and organized a church with 21 members.⁴³

"... And who knows but that you have come to your royal position for such a time as this" (Esther 4:14 NIV).

Throughout my time as an educator, I found it prudent to read articles, newsletters, and other materials from teachers. I have studied views from many different walks of life, including government schools, private schools, and primary to post grad. If they claim to be a teacher, I have read their thoughts.

Though I have picked up different ideas, I've noticed an ever-growing trend - teacher burnout is real. Many teachers, veteran and novice alike, are throwing in the towel and quitting. Most, if not all, students today have smartphones or tablets and are more competent with the machines than their teachers or even parents.

The vast unlimited access to information, which allows education to expand and grow in leaps and bounds, has created mass confusion for the students. The very core of our ministry in education is being shaken, disrupted, and challenged by Satan and his forces. So much so that children are no longer shielded from the adult controversies of our society. LGBT+ issues, racism, violence, and other immoral content are marketed for children's viewing programs and literature. Even in our churches, the polarized opinions of what is "sin" make it harder for teachers to give straight biblical answers. It is no wonder that students are angrier, more lost, and more confused than ever before.

However, as a Christian, God has given us the sacred duty to bring the children to Him and to teach them about Christ's love, acceptance, and justice. Some of you may already be "throwing in the towel" in your own lives. Perhaps amidst the chaos you are questioning the purpose and worth of your sweat and tears in God's ministries. Regardless of the reason, I urge you to remember what Mordecai said to Esther, you are here "for such a time as this."

It is my prayer for you today, that God will restore you and help you be where He needs you to be. Through His love, mercy, and justice may you remember that perhaps you were placed in your current situation, "for such a time as this."
