

Nothing to Fear

This is the twenty-ninth installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear: The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas,* published in 1983.

CHAPTER 9: Hastening the Coming of the Lord - Part 2

In the meantime, the work among the German-Russians was growing rapidly through the labors of ministers and of laymen returning to the area from America to evangelize their homeland.

In November 1890, the first general meeting of Seventh-day Adventists was held at Eigenheim in the Caucasus, attended by more than 100 of the 356 members then recorded in Russia.

Among those attending were a number of Russian Adventists from the Stavropol area who came with Babienco, their leader, and his sister. The group was happy to see them, yet apprehensive at having native Russians in the Protestant meeting (it was illegal to proselytize Russians). At this meeting Babienco became the first Russian Seventh-day Adventist to be ordained a church elder.

Soon after the meeting Babienco secretly visited the "brethren" in Tarashcha. Finding seven persons ready for church membership, he organized them into a church. At another place he found eight people "rejoicing in the truth". One of them, a bank clerk who had a good education in Russian and Polish, soon helped in the preparation of tracts in Polish.

Less than a year after his ordination, because of his evangelistic work among the Russians, Babienco and seven members of his church at Stavropol were sentenced to exile at Herusy, the terminus of the 200-mile stagecoach route.

Persecution only served to multiply the work. The German members who had met with the Russians were sent under arrest to their home colonies on the Volga where they continued to do

missionary work.

Babienco's sister continued the work in Stavropol until she was also exiled. But the church remained strong and leaders were developed who carried the gospel to other places.

Babienco himself, enroute to Herusy, talked to the Russian Protestant coachmen; soon an interest was kindled and within three years, more than 200 persons in that area began to keep the seventh-day Sabbath.

Babienco was threatened with another exile, even farther from Russian centers, but the amnesty proclaimed on the accession of Czar Nicholas II prevented this. Nevertheless, his five-year term was increased by another eight years. Separation from his family and continued harassment by the political administration turned his mind to emigration. With the help of English Protestants he went to Romania in 1896, where his family joined him.

In 1903 the family emigrated to Canada and settled on a farm in Saskatchewan.

Sharing his father's evangelistic fervor, Babienco's son, Theophil T., became a Seventh-day Adventist minister and began to preach among the large numbers of Russians then immigrating to the United States and Canada.³

In the meantime, Juda A. Litwinenco, a Ukrainian farmer who had settled at Herried (Campbell County), South Dakota, had become a Seventh-day Adventist about the turn of the century. Acquainted with the large Russian Stundist settlements in the McLean-McHenry-Ward County area of North Dakota, Litwinenco desired to share his new-found faith with his fellow countrymen.⁴

In the summer of 1906, Babienco and Litwinenco worked together among the Russians south of Balfour in McHenry County, holding evangelistic meetings and giving Bible studies resulting in the organization of a church of 28 members, the first Russian Adventist church in North America.⁵

Relational Trust

A few weeks ago my husband and I decided that life wasn't crazy enough so we found ourselves at the animal shelter adopting a one year-old dog named Clyde. Needless to say, the demands of that week were rearranged as I found myself supervising a dog and adjusting him to our home. I felt like I had to follow him everywhere to learn his bathroom cues and make sure he didn't get into any mischief. A few days after we got him, he managed to get ahold of a roll of paper towels and shred them all over the basement. Clyde knew that he'd been naughty and proceeded to go curl up and hide in a far corner of our house. I don't know much background on Clyde, whether he was abandoned, abused, or adored prior to his arrival at the shelter; but we know that every external behavior, good or bad, has an internal motivator. All week I thought I was determining whether I could trust Clyde, but seeing him huddled in the corner reminded me that he's still figuring out whether he can trust me.

I once had a group of 7-8th grade girls who were boy crazy and unfortunately, none of them had a healthy home or mom in their life to mentor them through adolescence. One particular Friday, these girls were bouncing off the walls excited because they were going to the away high school football game that evening and were traveling with some "super-hot" high school boys. Naturally,

this made me nervous and alarm bells were ringing in my ears. I asked whether they had adult permission, supervision, or chaperones, and they couldn't understand why I was so worried. It played out like a teen movie and I was the nagging buzz-kill adult. As we dismissed, I pulled the girls aside and made sure they each had my phone number to call in case things went south and I needed to go pick them up somewhere. I looked them in the eyes and told them, "I trust you. Please do not break my trust." The school secretary told me later that the girls went down to the office to wait for their rides and were complaining about how I had been all over them about this football game. The secretary told the girls, "You realize it's because she loves you and wants you to be safe right?" The girls were shocked! "Wait, she's being this hard on us because she loves us?" It was a paradigm shift for them and I received text messages the entire night updating me on the football game and letting me know when they were each home safe.

Isn't it crazy that God trusts each of us and offers us the freedom of choice to trust Him back? Trust can be really hard! Sometimes it takes reminders like Clyde or my group of girls to remember that trust is relational, running both directions as we receive trust and extend trust. In Hebrews 2:13, Paul says, "I will put my trust in Him." And again he says, "Here am I, and the children God has given me."

My prayer this week is that the young people in your life will recognize your love for them amidst every external behavior they throw your way. I pray for your wisdom and discernment in identifying the internal motivators, the heart of any issues that might arise. I pray that we will each renew our trust in Him and model that trust. And finally, let us rededicate our desire that each young person will put their trust in Jesus so someday soon in heaven, we can say, "Here I am, and the children you have given me."



We selected two projects to support this year: well-digging for villages in Cambodia and outfits of clothing for children in Chad.

On the evening of the fair, tables were set up in the gym and many folk brought items and laid out their wares. The event was advertised on a local radio station and people invited their friends and neighbors. By the end of the evening, a total of \$5,101.58 was given for missions (some through direct donations as well as through purchasing items). We were so thrilled to be able to send such a significant amount to support these worthy projects. One attendee who gave a generous donation commented that they were happy to donate since this event's purpose was for a good cause.

I am blessed to belong to a church and school board that has committed to not hold fundraisers for our school's operating expenses. God has blessed, and in the five years that I have been at Invitation Hill School, the numbers have never been in the red. When the school has a need and it is placed before the congregation, it has been met (and quickly) EVERY single time. This story's icing on the cake is that exactly a week after this mission benefit event, a check was given for the needs of our school for almost the exact amount as we had sent out to support the mission projects. It was a double blessing - we had the opportunity to give and God returned the blessing back to us. What a mighty God we serve!

The Challenge

The other night, I called my 87-year-old uncle who served in the Navy during WWII. I asked him if he had ever seen anything like the events we are seeing in our world today. Instantly his reply was, "No."

In times like these I have asked God, on more than one occasion, "How can we as your people impact our world? How will we ever fulfill the unique calling You have placed on us as a Church?"

In response to my questioning, God put on my heart one thing that could be done. The idea originated from a documentary I saw on YouTube. It was about a revival that took place in 1970 at Asbury College, in Wymore, KY. Dr. Kinlaw, the acting president during the time, shared where the roots of the revival began to take hold - it was in God's Word. Six students, under a deep sense of their need for a closer connection with God, challenged one another to do two things. First, they committed to reading their Bibles every day, for 30 days. Then they committed to writing down and sharing, or witnessing, to one another what God had revealed to them in their time alone with Him. With those humble beginnings a revival was born. The revival would spread with power across North America as well as to other parts of the world. God says to His people, "...these words that I command you today shall be on your heart... You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates" (Deuteronomy 6:6,8-9).

Starting in January of this year, I offered a challenge to anyone who wanted to participate in the Huron Adventist church and to my own family members. I did so through two texting groups which had already been established. The challenge was this: To commit to reading your Bible each day for the month (each month since, I've made a renewed commitment offer to the larger group), writing down what you learned, and sharing it with the group. Where in Scripture and how much each person read daily, was totally up to them.

Not everyone chose to participate, for legitimate reasons all their own, but for those who did and have continued to renew our commitment each month, it has proven to be a tremendous blessing! How could it not be? I can safely say that we have all grown closer to God and to one another as a result. This month I have included the Mitchell church family and they have taken hold of it with vigor!

So, may I challenge you, dear reader? Are you a part of a texting group(s), or with people here and there, who you believe would be willing to commit, one month at a time, to such an experiment? Invite them to join you in reading the Bible every day for one month; then to share/witness, in brief, what they've learned that day. All great revivals begin with God's Word as we "bind" our hearts to the heart of our Creator.


