# **Dakota Adventist Academy Now Has an App!?**



# DAA Work Bee

April 3 was a dreary, drizzly, cold Sunday morning when 50 or so volunteers joined with about 20 students and teachers from the academy to form the first annual DAA work Bee. Lana Gibson served up a hearty breakfast to those who had arrived the night before, and by 8:30am, we were in the circle in front of the administration offices to be given our assignments for the day. Eric Garrett, the plant services director, did an excellent job of arranging work that was to be done and tools were all set out for the occasion.

When Elder Mark Piotrowski first proposed the plan, I was skeptical that we would have much of a turnout. After all, with spring arriving, gardens to plant, and so many other things clamoring

Instead, our Dakota people responded. They signed up and they showed up. Many people brought specialized skills, while others put their hands to whatever tasks were assigned. The attitudes were great, and the day turned out to be a lot of fun.

While many of those who came to work were people I have seen on boards, at Campmeeting, or Regionals, there were a number of people whom I had not met before. In attendance were alumni from DAA, PVA, and SRA as well as individuals who actively and solidly support the school by flying their Dakota pride. We had people from each of the last four graduating classes, people from DAA's first graduating class, and people from everywhere in between. As we rubbed shoulders throughout the day, we shared stories and we got to know one another. The relationships formed were as meaningful as the work that was accomplished. As a child, I lived in a Ukrainian Orthodox community with multi-generational gatherings for everything from barn raising to harvest, weddings, and funerals. This event had all of the feel-good atmosphere of those days - a wide range of personalities, ages, and skills working together for one common purpose.

Many tasks were accomplished. Some work was done in dorm rooms that only see residents during Campmeeting or Alumni Weekend, repairs were done on walls that were long overdue. We also continued the ceiling tile project, completing the math room, the science room, and the room adjacent to the office. Desks were refinished, electrical connections were brought up to code, post holes were dug for fencing, and a host of other activities were completed. Perhaps the biggest job of the day was the removal of 80+ seats in the main chapel/auditorium. We look forward to seeing how it serves at Campmeeting this summer.

The cafeteria was full at lunchtime and the buzz of conversation was exciting to take in. At the end of the day, when the work bee ended, any mess that had been made was cleaned up and the school was returned to what it had been just the day previous. In fact, students or staff who had not been able to be there on the weekend might have missed some of the changes made. But those of us who participated came away from the day inspired, revitalized, and ready to return to work with a renewed sense of purpose. Thank you to all those who came, who participated, and who cast a vision for what could be done in a short time by a small band of motivated individuals.



# Giving to Dakota Adventist Academy

Many who give to DAA experience the satisfaction of knowing their gift makes a real difference in the life of a young person. You help in "Build Friendships for Eternity." #### **Annual Fund Goal**

### \$275,000 / year

Gifts to the Annual Fund are unrestricted donations that are valuable to the operation of the school. They contribute to the stability and security of the school program and are applied where the need is greatest.

# **Worthy Student Fund Goal** \$125,000 / year

These gifts go to work immediately in assisting students with financial needs. Approximately half of our students currently receive assistance from this fund. Support is needed annually, especially in these financially difficult times.

# **Dorm Renovation Goal** \$80,000 / year

Our students spend many hours in their dorm rooms throughout the school year. It is their home away from home. Here they study, sleep, relax, and spend personal time in worship. In addition, the dorms are used during Alumni Weekend, Campmeeting, and other special events.

## Non-cash Gifts

Donations of shares of stock, land, and crops are just a few ideas for non-cash donations.

### **Legacy Gifts**

Cifts left in the form of a legacy through your estate plans play a vital part in the operation of DAA. #### **Endowment Gifts**

These gifts are a major contribution to the school's future stability and are often considered a legacy gift. These gifts, held by the Dakota Conference Corportation, include permanent funds that provide lasting financial resources to DAA and its programs. Invested in interestearning accounts, the income is used annually for the designated purpose of the endowment.

# **Kungel Family Endowment Fund**

Established by Lenhardt & Darlene Kungel, this fund will provide two Dakota students a \$1,500 annual scholarship.

# **PVA-Ron Purkapile Student Scholarship Fund**

The purpose of this scholarship is to provide South Dakota students with supplemental funds to attend DAA. Recipients will need to meet scholarship requirements. Students will be selected on a yearly basis by the scholarship committee.
