

Nothing to Fear

This is the 45th installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear: The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas*, published in 1983.

CHAPTER 10: The School is a Live Question - Part 4

During the same period the arduous process of maintaining and improving the academy's physical plant progressed with a two-stepforward-one-step-backward cadence. Water problems plagued the academy during most of its existence. Historical records of the academy's early years talk of digging new wells or enlarging old ones during 1908, 1909, 1912 and 1919. Just after the completion of the first of these wells, conference and academy administrators confidently reported that pipes from the well "have been connected" so that the continual trips up the hill for water could soon become a relic of the past, and that a bath and sewage system would be part of the academy's modern facilities "soon." 24

The following year, however, new academy principal J.F. Simon reported that "a large well is being dug, and a tank placed in the attic of the main building to force water through all the buildings", adding the caveat that "the water question is a problem not yet solved" and early in 1910, Conference President C.J. Kunkel reported to North Dakota church members that the Conference Committee (or Academy Board) had "talked over" a plan for a water system, including "bathroom and toilet facilities" and had "decided that such a plan should be worked out and the cost ascertained." The problem of "inadequate lighting" (kerosene lamps) and lack of fire protection was also discussed.²⁵

Two years later, the problems still remained unsolved. Another well failure required hauling water from the Sheyenne River to be stored in four large barrels kept in the crowded kitchen, and a small fire in the main building served to underline the water

problem. Plans for a new well, a gasoline-fired pump to transport water to the supply tank and cistern, and the construction of two bathrooms - one in the girls' dormitory and one in the proposed new laundry building - were announced by the Academy Board. 26

Sometime during the next five years these plans apparently became reality; Conference President S.E. Jackson reported in mid-1918 that the conference administration had been "severely" criticized for the installation of "the electric light plant, the water system, etc." Nine months later, the *Reaper* reported however, that work had begun on "a new well" for the academy.²⁷

Three new structures were added to the campus during the years 1912 to 1915. The construction of a new laundry building, measuring 16 x 24 feet, to be located east of the girls' dormitory was announced in 1912. A large new "hip roof" barn was built during 1913 on a previously existing foundation begun several years earlier, replacing the "poor excuse" for a barn that had served the school farm.²⁸

The third new building added to the campus during these years was a new 30 x 60 by eighteen feet high girls' dormitory named North Hall. A new dormitory had been an obvious need for several years as the enrollment at the academy had steadily increased; in 1915 rooms had to be rented in the residence of Mr. Saunders of the local community for boys who could not be accommodated in the school's living quarters. 29

Actual discussion of building the new facility had apparently begun sometime earlier, but at an academy board meeting late in 1913, when it was revealed that the school was \$10,000 in debt, the board voted to suspend any further improvements and attempt to pay off the debt by the end of 1914.³⁰

A brief series of good agricultural years had begun to improve the economic condition of North Dakotans and of church members, enabling the conference to eliminate the debt on schedule. Because the school was now free of debt, the plans committee of the Conference Session held in connection with Jamestown camp meeting of June 1915 recommended the construction of the new dormitory during the summer of 1916. The constituents, eyeing the crowded conditions of the school and wary of the fickle nature of the agricultural economy, voted to begin construction before the start of the coming school year, and pledged \$8,000 for the project, \$2,000 more than the estimated cost of the new building. Actual construction, delayed until after harvest in order to be sure the crop situation remained favorable to the meeting of those pledges, began in earnest in August, and the girls occupied their new home in November, leaving their older facility to the boys.³¹

Lighten Your Load

North Dakota is not known for its steep hills. And yet, we have one.

At least, WE think it's steep. It's the only hill my family farms that can't be driven up with a fully loaded combine or a fully loaded grain cart. In fact, I've always had strict orders to stay off that hill and let someone more experienced tackle it.

The experienced driver gets to the top from the gently sloping west side after emptying his combine hopper into the grain cart and giving himself a pep talk. (At

least, I imagine there's a pep talk. That's what I would do.) Then, he flips on his rotors and reels, and inches to the south edge. The weight of the combine pushes him faster and faster, so he must constantly pull back on the stick to try to slow it down. Once down, he circles back to the top via the gentle west slope and repeats the downhill plunge for three or four more passes



before the hill is considered "safe" for the rest of us.

The important key for today's thought is: if you want to succeed, you need to unload first!

Job had friends to support him when multiple catastrophes struck. That blind guy that Jesus healed with a loogie? His friends were instrumental in leading Him to Jesus and advocating for him. Galatians 6:2 says, "Bear one another's burdens and thereby fulfill the law of Christ."

I know I've felt much relief when I've shared my burdens with my sister or a trusted friend. That support and encouragement are priceless!

It's also important to give your worries to God. "Cast all your cares on Him, for he cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7); "Cast all your cares on the Lord and He will sustain you" (Psalm 55:22). And this one is a favorite: "The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:4-7).

Remember to reach out to a friend if you have worries, to be a friend to others, and to cast your deepest burdens on the Lord.

The reason for this is so the neighbor does not come home, see an item waiting at their door, and feel relieved to have missed a group of "churchgoers" who want something from them. The members feel that it is important to show neighborly love without any expectations or needing something in return.

The Adventist group wears casual clothes so they appear less intimidating and try to keep to a minimum of three people - including at least one child. Within the gift is a church business card with a QR code for the individual to look up information about their church should they want to find out more about the givers. Gifts have included 9-volt batteries for smoke detectors, single roses, potted petunias, bubbles, and a good working pen.

This past Sunday, members hosted a Family Fun Day in the parking lot of their church. Included in the event were an ice cream truck, bounce house, obstacle course, face painting, and all the sweet corn a person wanted to eat. The day prior, an invitation for the event was included with the neighborly gift. Over thirty-five community guests attended and relationships between "neighbors" were established.



Once a month our ministry sets up booths at two of our campuses - NDSU and MSUM. These booths provide books and resources that help students deal with the many secular challenges in and outside of their classrooms. Most of the students we minister to are not Adventists. Many of the students we dialogue with are either not Christian, of another religion, or no religion (an ever-increasing number).



Why are Christians ages 18 to 29 leaving the church and rethinking their commitment to faith? Based on new research conducted by the Barna Group, one thing is responsible for this ever-growing statistic, found in the book, *You Lost Me*: the Christian community has failed to "equip young adults."

To equip students, we offer free books at our booths on the scientific evidence for why Christianity and belief in God is logical even though science is misused to say God is a myth. Why is Jesus Christ not *just* a great guy? Why is evolution *not* the truth about how all life got here? How do you know God really spoke in the Bible? Who is to say I shouldn't have sex before marriage, or why is getting married important at all? These are the challenges that most of our youth face culturally and even academically.



With a focus on student and teacher wellbeing, a Conference-wide School Counselor role was developed to enhance care and connectedness within Adventist schools. Now, during the Covid-fallout of mental health crises and trauma,

student emotional and social growth is more vital than ever. In order to expand a Kid-Counselor reach, this online model allows the capability to provide Biblically-based Social-Emotional learning for Adventist school students across the North-American Division! As of 2022, Counseltation has served 15 Conferences with individual, small group, and whole school student support."
