

#### Where We Stand

Beginning in September, we did a series of seven Town Halls across the Dakota Conference to share the trend lines in both the Conference and Dakota Adventist Academy because we want our constituency to fully understand the reality of our situation. With Conference support of \$540,000, Alumni support averaging about \$200,000 annually, collecting 100% of tuition, and receiving 100% of Circle of Faith financial pledges, the current school year is still projecting a \$363,000 shortfall. We as a Conference have committed to somehow covering that deficit but cannot continue to do so going forward.

To address this situation, we held a joint K-12/Executive Committee meeting on November 6, 2022. The proposal brought forward stated as follows: The K-12 and Executive Committee members will decide from among the following options regarding the future of Dakota Adventist Academy.

Option 1 - Sell Existing Assets

Option 2 - Reduce Employees

Option 3 - Cease Operations

Extensive time was spent discussing each of the options.

Among the assets the Conference owns are our office building, parsonages, and summer camps. These are Conference entities that promote and expand the mission and ministry of the Conference. In addition, the Academy owns approximately 1,000 acres of agricultural land.

To close the shortfall gap, a minimum of five full-time employees would need to be reduced. Since the Academy could not operate with five fewer staff members, a reduction would also affect Conference employees, including office and pastoral staff.

The third option would require calling for a special constituency session and would take 75% of the votes to cease Academy operations.

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Following an extensive discussion of the options, a motion was made to take "Cease Operations" off the table. After a season of prayer, a secret ballot vote was taken. The vote was 18 people in favor of removing Option 3, and 8 against. Thus, it is officially voted that we are not going to consider closing the Academy. Now came the time to discuss how to fund what was just voted.

Several times the sale of the Academy's agricultural land had been mentioned. While the land is an asset, it is not integral to the mission and ministry of the Conference or the Academy – even though it nets the Academy approximately \$55,000 in rental income per year. Based on a preliminary discussion with a land auction company, the land is valued between 3 – 3.5 million dollars. With this information in mind, a non-binding vote was taken in regard to selling the land. That vote was 15 in favor, 9 against.

In conclusion, the Executive Committee will finalize a plan to fund the Academy for the foreseeable future. The land sale will likely be a key component to obtaining the funds required to care for financial shortfalls in the future. This meeting will take place on December 11, 2022.

We are committed to finding a solution, but that takes two vital necessities – students and funds. With at least 55 students, we would not have a funding shortage. For many years the Dakota Conference was able to cover that monetary shortfall. We no longer have the ability to do that given our current financial realities.

Please keep us in your prayers as we continue to seek a sustainable path forward.

# Echoes of the Apostolic Church

And the Lord added to the church daily those who were being saved...believers were increasingly added to the Lord, multitudes of both men and women. - Acts 2:47; 5:14.

The Apostolic Church remains the model to emulate of what the church is to become.



One of the tasks of pastors and lay leaders is for them to lead their churches to narrow the gap between where their churches are today (what we typically experience at church on Sabbath mornings) to what the church was like in the days of Pentecost. The last 2,000 years have seen massive changes come into the church. We have veered from the blueprint. The New Testament presents a clear picture of God's design for the church. As we seek to assimilate these timeless principles in ministry, we will in time, be able to see the same results in our churches today. So what are some of the outstanding characteristics of His early church? Can we see the first signs of this move back towards the original plan, can we hear echoes of those early church values being replicated in our day? What are the characteristics of a church full of vitality and health as we read of in Acts? Actually, there are many: the early Christians were fully devoted Spirit-filled disciples, they experienced God's providential workings on a daily basis, their ministry consisted of faithful preaching of God's Word, eating together, faithfulness to the teachings of the Scriptures, they prayed much together, gathered in warm fellowship, exhibited love for each other and for the lost, to mention just a few.

One other important characteristic of the early church is their exponential growth. The Greco-Roman world was stirred by the presence of this primitive group that arose from Judea. Their fame spread like wildfire across the provinces of the empire. The early church was a healthy body, ever moving forward and expanding its influence and reach, even when the opposition seemed overbearing. A healthy congregation invites and welcomes seekers and new believers. Consider the early church in Jerusalem. From about 120 believers at the time of Jesus' ascension (Acts 1), the church grew to more than 3,000 after Peter's sermon on the day of Pentecost. Then the church kept growing from that day on through the leading and empowerment of the Holy Spirit through the apostles (Acts 2:42-43). More and more people believed the message of salvation and became Christians because of the compelling power of God in the church. So how do we shape up to the early church here in the Dakotas? We are on the brink of great things that the Lord wants to do for us. How shall we respond?

You may not be aware, but our mission field has a fast-growing population. I shared with our Executive Committee recently that both states in our conference territory are experiencing growth faster than the national average. The rate of growth of North Dakota from 2012 to 2021 was 10.4% and that of South Dakota over the same period was 7.4% (US population national growth rate for the same period is 7.3%). In the 20 fastest-growing cities in both states, the Dakota Conference has established churches in 13 of these urban areas. There are people in our communities that are receptive and ready to hear the Everlasting Gospel. The Holy Spirit is preparing for a fast-closing work.

Our conference leadership recently launched a church renewal initiative called "ReVITALIZEd." In the months ahead all 44 of our churches will be invited to participate in a journey of spiritual renewal, mission refocus, and health improvement. We are praying for the Lord's leading in this initiative. Four churches have already signed up as a first "run" as we look towards growing our conference. We hope to have this process going in at least 10 churches before the end of 2023. Be listening to announcements coming to your church about this in the future.

We have wonderful times to look forward to. The pen of inspiration reflecting on the hour of glory ahead wrote, "The prophecies which were fulfilled in the outpouring of the former rain at the opening of the gospel are again to be fulfilled in the latter rain at its close. Servants of God, with their faces lighted up and shining with holy consecration, will hasten from place to place to proclaim the message from heaven. By thousands of voices, all over the earth, the warning will be given. The message will be carried not so much by argument as by the deep conviction of the Spirit of God" (Great Controversy, p. 611-12). Be sure you are part of this divine kindling dear fellow believer, we can clearly see His Spirit stirring our churches to action to accomplish a completed mission.




Membership in the Dakota Conference decreased by 4 members or 0.1% in the 3rd Quarter (July - September).

#### Outdoor School

Outdoor School seeks to empower students to explore the natural world and encounter their Creator God. This program had been on hold due to COVID-19, so students in grades K-8 were excited to gather again for a week at Northern Lights Camp. Outdoor School provides an opportunity for students to enjoy a unique educational environment, foster scientific curiosity, develop friendships, learn about God through experiencing nature, and create a desire for lifelong outdoor learning.



Students were divided up into grade groups to rotate through learning stations that correlated to this year's science curriculum. Teachers led out in a food chain art project, classification of animals, and a very exciting fish dissection. Students visited Metigoshe State Park's Learning Center for a lesson in wildlife ecology and to play a new game called Ranger. Cooler weather prevented lake activities but learning to forage for edible plants and a photo scavenger hunt kept students active and exploring the fall flora and fauna.



Afternoon STEM (Science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) projects were a highlight as students were divided up into multi-grade teams, with an 8th grader leading each team. TJ Roberts, teacher from Sioux Falls, led out in a rocket-building project where students developed a simple paper prototype before moving on to create a large bottle rocket. Teams created a supply budget and then proceeded to build a decorative rocket with hopes that it would fly the longest. Lower-grade students excitedly counted down "3-2-1," before performing their role as rocket launcher.

Another STEM project found students working in upper and lower-grade pairs to build a boat using only string and nature supplies found around camp. Sticks were tied together, leaves packed in for waterproofing, and makeshift sails hung. As the boats were launched off the beach students could be heard saying, "Wow, look at that one made with bark, it's not sinking. That was smart!" or, "Our leaf sail is catching the wind!" Innovation at its finest.

Dakota Adventist Academy seniors spent the week leading out in evening games and assisting with the meals and learning stations. Their help was greatly appreciated, and their energy even more so as games of Banana Tag, Capture the Flag, and Duck Duck Goose encouraged teamwork and healthy sportsmanship. Anytime a high schooler invests in an elementary school student, a difference is made.

The week's theme was "All Creatures Great and Small," based on Job 12:7-10. Morning and evening worships drew students together as they connected the wonders of nature with a wonderful, loving God. Each school took turns leading out in worship music followed by devotionals shared by Dakota pastors and conference personnel. Initially, students would only sit with their friends from their school, but by the end of the week, everyone had made so many new friends that you couldn't tell any of the schools apart. It was a beautiful visual of the family of God!


