Use surgery as a last resort after trying other more natural approaches like yoga, water exercises, optimized nutritional support,

and hot-and-cold fomentations to improve circulation and ease pain. You may be surprised at how the body can heal when given a chance.

# **Service Hosts Eighty-two People**



The Red River Seventh-day Adventist Church celebrated their second annual International Thanksgiving Service, "Thanksgiving Around The World" on Sabbath, November 18, 2017. The service, which was well attended, followed the pattern of hymn singing, then scripture reading and finally praise and testimony time. There was a high level of involvement by the congregation, many of whom wore their national or



cultural dress. The result was a veritable sea of color.

The service started with a special welcome, which consisted of a member from each of the different countries represented in the congregation introducing themselves and their nation of origin, followed by saying "Welcome and happy Sabbath" in their native language. This was well received and set a positive tone for the service. There were eleven countries represented in the welcome including Mexico, England, Haiti, Liberia, Kenya, Zimbabwe, Ghana, Philippines, Jamaica, Trinidad & Tobago and USA. Other nations in the congregation that were not represented in the welcome included the Democratic Republic of Congo, Rwanda, El Salvador, Sudan and the Bahamas.



Eighty-two people attended the worship service followed by an international potluck, which was a high point of the day and appreciated by those in attendance. The primary purpose of this service was to provide a platform for the members to express thanks to God for the blessings of the year while demonstrating acceptance and affirmation for the cultural diversity of the congregation. It is an event members can invite their non-Adventist relatives and friends to. There were several non-members in attendance that expressed positive feedback on the service. The church plans on continuing this

tradition next year with another International Thanksgiving Service.
