The television was abuzz with the news a terrorist had taken the lives of innocent people in New York City. Some commentators tried to play down the information, but soon it was impossible to ignore. Radical Islam had struck once again. The bodies of people hit with a pickup truck were strewn everywhere. As painful as these graphic pictures have been to watch, it appears that they are not going away any time soon. Radical Islam is looking for a



showdown with Christianity and the West. In light of this continued confrontation, some are looking at Daniel 11 for illumination. Does it speak of major confrontations between Christianity and Islam before Jesus comes? It depends on who you believe is the king of the north and the king of the south. But as time goes along it is hard to ignore the Muslim presence in our end-time world view. Some theologians believe the king of the north is false Christianity. Two great confrontations have taken place in history between Christianity and Islam, and the third will happen just before Jesus comes ushering in a time of trouble. The basic timeline of the three major conflicts are as follows;

- Crusades AD 1095 to AD 1291 (Daniel 11:25-28)
- Ottoman Empire AD 1449 to AD 1840 (Daniel 11:29-30)
- Future Conflict it could begin at any time (Daniel 11:40-45)

Josiah Litch, one of our early church leaders, predicted that the fall of the Ottoman Empire was the second prophecy spoken of in Daniel 11:29-30 in an article written for the Midnight Cry, on January 6, of 1843.

So we find it interesting to note that some believe there could be a third woe just ahead of us in which once again a showdown may take place between the Christian world and the Muslim world. The call could be made to align under the banner of Rome for the third time to fight Islam. None of us know for certain how prophecy will play itself out, but the concept is intriguing. We do know that Muslims are projected to be the fastest growing major religious group in the world, growing at a rate twice that of Christianity. As always true Christianity will find itself caught in the middle of the conflict awaiting a miraculous victory and salvation from God.

Daniel 11:40 "At the time of the end the king of the south shall attack him; and the king of the north shall come against him like a whirlwind, with chariots, horsemen, and with many ships; and he shall enter the countries, overwhelm them, and pass through." Daniel 11 is difficult to understand but as we get closer to the end of time, more will be revealed. It is time to spend time in His Word and pray for the Holy Spirit's leading.

## Pastors on the Move



## Evangelism in Mitchell, SD

Twenty-three guests registered for the first night of *Revelations' Urgent Call* meetings being held in Mitchell, SD with Dakota Evangelist Donavon Kack. Working with him are his family and Jody Schumacher of Kulm, ND. Four hundred sixty-seven Great Controversy books were distributed on a small donation of two to five dollar basis to people at businesses and homes in Mitchell and an Amish community south of town. Some gave ten to twenty dollars, saying give the book to those who can't afford it.

An older gentleman, who appeared to be in charge of the art project at the Corn Palace, declined the book after Hiram Kack had given him the canvass. He said he knew God was working, that he was already close to God, and that he fell asleep every night praying for people he knew. "After visiting for a few minutes, we said goodbye and walked a little ways and watched the other team canvass...," says Kack. "Meanwhile our prayer team, in the van, was praying for the man who declined. A few seconds later he called me back over to where he was sitting and asked, 'How much did you say that book was again?' 'Well, we're just leaving it for a small donation of two to five dollars.' He pulled out a five-dollar bill and said, 'You know what, I need that book.'"

A family with six children asked if kids were welcome and was assured that they were. They said they had other friends with large families and would let them know.

"The Great Controversy should be very widely circulated. It contains the story of the past, the present and the future. In its outline of the closing scenes of this earth's history, it bears a powerful testimony in behalf of the truth. ## Payabya Mission Closes

In the 1920s Brother and Sister E. L. Marley (parents of E. L. Marley, formerly Northern Union Conference president) began working with the Sioux Indians near Kyle and Porcupine, SD, when they were employed as government schoolteachers. In 1940, the Marleys helped establish a new village, a government school and a Seventh-day Adventist church at Red Shirt Table near the Cheyenne River. A church building was erected on a site leased to the conference by the government. After Marleys moved away in 1941, the Rapid City district pastor cared for the church.

In 1965, Elder and Mrs. Marvin Walters came to Red Shirt Table from working among the Indians of the American Southwest. The conference purchased a ten-acre plot eight miles east of the new Indian Hospital at Pine Ridge, SD on Highway 18. Buildings were moved and remodeled and school began in September of 1968 with Larry Gatewood as teacher of ten pupils. The enrollment continued to climb until the school year of 1978-79 showed 42 students enrolled in eight grades.

Wilbur and Janice Mauk served at the mission from 1985 to 1995 continuing the school program for ten years but were forced to retire due to medical issues. Steven and Darlene Custer were listed as program managers from 1997 until 2002. Afterward, the mission was rented to other Christian non-profits and suffered significant deterioration.

Bill and Marilyn Glassford were hired in 2013 to help restore the mission and a school was again started in 2015. However, vandalism of the mission director's personal property, the school and school property and the teacher's residence and personal property caused the school to close just before the start of the second year.

Several pastors served from 2013 to the closing of the mission. Retired Pastor David and Eunice Brown served at the mission followed by Pastor Joseph and Jimmie Story. Pastor Marion and Elva Miller of the Hot Springs/Custer district served for a couple of years and

then Pastor Joseph and Jimmie Story returned. In October of 2017 the decision was made to sell Payabya Mission at #3 Community on the Pine Ridge Reservation to the Oglala Sioux Tribe. The Tribe is excited to have the resident houses and buildings to use for tribal meetings. Arrangements were made for those who would like to attend church to continue to use the church building on Sabbath.

Native Ministries Coordinator Debra Claymore-Cuny continues to work among the many reservations in the Dakotas and associated hub cities.
