The Need for Adventist Education

Pastoring a church in Palmer, Alaska, provided many opportunities to get involved in the community. One such possibility came in the form of an invitation to join the local Rotary Club. One hour a week over lunch seemed like a small price to pay for getting to know the local business leaders, so I accepted. It was not long before I was asked to present a Rotary program on self-worth to the seventh graders at the local public school. The presentation developed by Rotary International was based on what some would call Natural Law. Grades can be changed through hard work and study, but eye color cannot. Body weight can change, but one's gender cannot. Friends can change, but biological parents will always be yours forever. It was a positive program for the students, and they seemed to appreciate being able to discuss what it was like to be 13 in a big new world.

Today, 20 years later, the presentation is no longer listed on Rotary's website. The world has changed. Some school boards and teachers would push back at what was perfectly acceptable 20 years ago. Even many of the Laws of Nature as defined and supported by the philosophers like Plato and Aristotle have been relegated to the trash heap. Our current culture reminds me of how Adventist education is needed now more than ever. Children are growing up confused and angry looking for something solid to build their lives upon.

Some years ago, I came across a story by Fred Craddock, a religion professor at Emory University, which has helped me understand how important Christianity is when everything seems to be falling apart.

Craddock states that he and his wife were on vacation in Tennessee and found themselves in a Gatlinburg restaurant for breakfast. While eating they noticed an elderly man making the rounds talking with people and moving in their direction. Being on vacation, they wished that he would not stop and bother them; after all, they were on vacation and were tired of dealing with people. They just wanted a quiet meal together, but the elderly gentleman came anyway. As he stopped at the table, he said, "How ya aw doing?" "Where ya aw from?" "What do ya aw do for a livin'?" When the old man found out that Fred was a preacher and a teacher of preachers, he said, "Boy, da I have a story fer ya."

He grabbed a chair and invited himself to their table. "You see," he said, "I was not born far from here. Just over those hills. My mother wasn't married when I was born, so I had some hard times. When I started school, my classmates had a name for me, and it wasn't very nice. I used to go off at recess and lunchtime by myself because the taunts from my classmates cut so deeply. What was worse was going downtown and feeling every eye burning a hole through me. They were all wondering who my real father was. When I was about 12 years old, a new preacher came to town. I would always go late and slip out early, so no one would talk to me. But there was something about his stories that just kept me coming back. One day, the preacher said the benediction so fast that I got caught and had to walk out with the crowd. I could feel every eye in church on me. Just about the time I got to the door, I felt a big hand on my shoulder. I looked up, and the preacher was looking right at me. "What's your hurry son?" he said. "Who are you? Whose boy are you?" I felt the old weight come on me. It was like a big black cloud. I couldn't speak. Even the preacher was putting me down. But as he looked at me, studying my face, he began to smile a big smile of recognition, "Wait a minute," he said. "I know who you are. I see a family resemblance. You are a child of God," he said. And with that, he slapped me on the back and said, "Boy, you've got a great inheritance. Go claim it." And then the old gentleman added, "That was the most important single sentence ever said to me."

The gentleman got up and began to leave, and Craddock said, "Wait, don't leave now. Who are you?" The old man said, "Hopper. Ben Hopper." It was then that Craddock recognized him. Yes, the good folks of Tennessee had twice elected him to be their governor.

The Dakota Conference of Seventh-day Adventists has recently extended a call to Mr. Raman Sathiyaseelan (Mr. Sathiya—pronounced Saw-tee-yah). As he completes his visa papers, Pastor Gary D. Wilson, a retired Adventist educator, will be filling in to start the school year.

Raman Sathiyaseelan was born in Sri Lanka and finished high school at Lakphana Adventist College. He then went on to Spicer Adventist College in India and completed an undergraduate degree from Southern Adventist University as an accounting major. He stayed on and completed his master's degree in education and administration from Andrews University.

Sathiya moved back to Sri Lanka and served at Lakpahana Adventist College as a teacher and vice principal for seven years (2007-2013). He then taught at Adventist International School in Sri Lanka as an economic, business studies, and accounting teacher from 2013-2015. In 2015, Sathiya accepted a call to serve as a teacher at Chiang Mai Adventist Academy in Thailand (2015-2018). He has just finished five years in Guam Micronesia Mission of Seventh-day Adventists as principal of Ebeye Adventist K-12 School. Giving to Dakota Adventist Academy

Many who give to DAA, experience the satisfaction of knowing their gift makes a real difference in the life of a young person. You help in "Building Friendships for Eternity." Your gifts will help us serve this generation and beyond. Working together, we can help our youth build friendships for eternity and a home in Heaven.

Annual Fund Goal

\$275,000 / year

Gifts to the Annual Fund are unrestricted donations that are valuable to the operation of the school. They contribute to the stability and security of the school program and are applied where the need is greatest.

Worthy Student Fund Goal

\$125,000 / year

These gifts go to work immediately in assisting students with financial needs. Approximately half of our students currently receive assistance from this fund. Support is needed annually, especially in these financially difficult times.

Dorm Renovation Goal

\$80,000 / year

Our students spend many hours in their dorm rooms throughout the school year. It is their home away from home. Here they study, sleep, relax, and spend personal time in worship. In addition, the dorms are used during Alumni Weekend, Campmeeting, and other special events.

Non-cash Gifts

Donations of shares of stock, land, and crops are just a few ideas for non-cash donations.

PVA-Ron Purkapile Student Scholarship Fund

The purpose of this scholarship is to provide South Dakota students with supplemental funds to attend DAA. Recipients will need to meet scholarship requirements. Students will be selected on a yearly basis by the scholarship committee.
