

Reformation in Song

Part of the 500 year anniversary of the Protestant Reformation includes music in the form of hymns dating back to that most difficult time in Christendom's fight for religious freedom. The great hymn writer Issac Watts, born in 1674, emerged as a reformation giant in explaining through music the power in the cross and the faith available in Jesus. According to books I have read, Issac's father, also

named Issac Watts, was a nonconformist preacher of the time and had been incarcerated twice for his

views on religion and freedom. As a young child, Watts was often taken in his mother's arms and set on a stone outside the prison walls as she talked to his father. Freedom of religion was not a secured right during that time period and the views of young Issac Watt's father were far from those in authority.

For this Issac received a spanking to which he cried:

O father, father, pity take And I will no more verses make.

Issac Watts survived his childhood and became a religious poet almost without equal. One of his greatest hymns was titled *When I Survey the Wondrous Cross*. The very first verse pretty well describes the christian walk:

When I survey the wondrous cross On which the Prince of Glory died, My richest gain I count but loss, And pour contempt on all my pride.

Although Watts, brilliant as he was in verse with the writing of 750 hymns, like the apostle Paul, counted it all as loss in the light of Christ's gift on the cross:

Were the whole realm of nature mine, That were an offering far to small: Love so amazing, so divine, Demands my souls my life, My all.

Hillcrest Utilizes Pilot Program

"But, Mrs. Frishman, I don't want science class to end!" That is something every teacher wants to hear. Hillcrest teachers were able to hear comments similar to this for two weeks thanks to an incredible program they piloted. Hillcrest Adventist School is a two-teacher school located in Jamestown, North Dakota, which had the opportunity to participate in *Our Creator's Space* through Southern Adventist University.

In order to engage students, Lower Grad Teacher Ms. Gutknecht, the lower grades teacher, and Head Teacher RaeLea Frishman have attempted to utilize the STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, and math) approach in their classrooms. Unfortunately, in small schools limited resources make it difficult to provide the latest technology and methods. *Our Creator's Space* was able to fill the void created by a lack of resources.

Our Creator's Space is meant to bring STEAM activities with a maker-space approach to small school classrooms, but with a focus on learning more about who Our Creator is through the lessons, learning experiences and discussions," per Pegi Flynt, developer of Our Creator's Space. Hillcrest teachers piloted two lessons, The Circulatory System and Forces of Motion. Both of the classrooms participated in these lessons, but the activities were tailored to be appropriate for each grade level.

Through the program they were able to obtain Google Cardboard Virtual Reality headsets and Ozobots, along with supplies for each of the hands-on activities planned. During the study of The Circulatory System, they utilized multiple methods to engage learning. For example, the students experienced an inside view of the heart, veins, and arteries using Google Cardboard. They were able to follow the path that blood travels through the body. The experience included viewing the effects of plaque on the vessels.

The focus for the second week was Forces of Motion. They continued the use of Google

Cardboard where students viewed a rollercoaster as if they were riding it. This



experience was used to help them design their own rollercoasters for their Ozobot to travel. Ozobots are small robots that make movements based on color codes. Students had to make the correct color combinations on their tracks for their Ozobot to traverse. It would demonstrate the potential and kinetic energy of their rollercoaster. This was just one of many fun projects that allowed the students to view a concept that is sometimes hard to grasp.

The advantage of STEAM versus traditional lecture methods is critical thinking, hands-on experiences, and creativity are at the core. This approach allows the students to connect their learning to an experience and makes concepts more tangible for them. Students who feel they have more ownership of their learning retain information better and are more willing to participate.

Hillcrest have the was blessed to opportunity to take part in this pilot program. These resources are now available for all subjects throughout the year. Google Cardboard headsets have been used to take a virtual field trip to Sutter's Mill in California where the Gold Rush began. Perhaps the Ozobots will be used next to map Paul's missionary journeys. The possibilities are endless. Hillcrest's teachers are excited for the future and how they can involve the resources gained from Our Creator's Space!

Monday, the students arrived in time to close out the school day with a worship and song by Tendai Mpezeni. Tuesday was so busy, starting


