

Nothing to Fear

This is the 59th installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear: The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas,* published in 1983.

Chapter 12: The Lord Gave Freedom - Part 4

The lighting of the revival fires took place at the remarkable camp meeting held at Velva June 21-28, 1908. Of the seven hundred in attendance, the majority were German, about one hundred were Russian and a large number of each of the nationalities represented were young people, for whom special efforts were made by J.F. Simon, an Elder Benson, and others. Many of these youth, according to church leaders, "had not yet known God's pardoning grace." Toward the end of the week, the work among the youth began to bear fruit. Elder G. B. Thompson of the General Conference Sabbath School Department described the scene:

"Friday a special work began among the young people, and after the services in the evening, some of the ministers began working for some of the German young people who were not converted. This effort spread to various tents, and finally a large number ... gathered again in the large tent and continued seeking God till early morning ... The Lord wrought greatly among the Germans and Russians and also among the English and Scandinavians ... It looked like the latter rain."

The next day, when Thompson made his appeal for money for foreign missions, the highly charged crowd began to pledge cash, various acreages of crops and land up to as much as 160 acres, totaling almost \$25,000.²³

Following the revival at Velva, the Russian churches grew rapidly and, according to

one Russian young person present, it was the events of the Velva camp meeting that awakened the desire of the Russian youth for education, resulting in the establishment of SRA's Russian Department two years later.²⁴

Among the group of 96 people who indicated their desire to be baptized were thirteen who chose to wait and be baptized back at their home church, Bowdon. Capitalizing on the opportunity, John Seibel conducted meetings at the Bowdon church following the camp meeting, and by the time of the baptism, there were 21 candidates, apparently all young people.

After the baptism, during a celebration of the communion service, according to Conference President Kunkel, "We heard a poor sinner cry for pardon, and soon we were compelled to set (the service) aside to lend a helping hand to those seeking mercy. Language cannot picture the experience between 7 p.m. and 3 a.m., but ... twenty-three dear souls found peace with their Savior," bringing the total of newly baptized members to 44.²⁵

Two additional camp meetings conducted during the summer of 1908 are worthy of special notice. The first, held at Dickinson July 6-12 drew about half of the approximately 80 Seventh-day Adventists scattered over the 20,000 square miles of District 7, the area west of the Missouri River, to the first Adventist camp meeting ever held in that part of the conference. Attendance by interested town folk was reported to be "quite good" also. Six persons were baptized at the close of the camp meeting.²⁶





Dakota Youth & Young Adults

In about two weeks, young adults from around the country will be making their way to Bismarck to begin a two-month ministry called summer camp. Months of prayer, travel, phone calls, and zoom meetings will come to a culmination as the Dakota Adventist Camps 2023 staff come together. It is super exciting to think about how all the work in hiring a staff will finally be realized. There were times during this process that I was worried, maybe even a bit fearful, if we would find the correct staff to run the activities that we were going to host this summer, create a team that will get along and work together, and have staff who would commit to avoiding unnecessary drama. When I think back to how God has led in this journey, I remember a quote I learned in school. It says: "We have nothing to fear for the future, except as we shall forget the way the Lord has led us, and His teaching in our past history" (LS, p.196).

These past two weeks I have been down at Flag Mountain checking on the progress

made on our showers and working to get other pieces in place for camp. While there is still much work to be done with the bathrooms, I am confident that God will provide the workers and supplies needed to complete the job in time. It is times like this where I know I must continue to place my trust in Him, for He has always been faithful in the past.

What kind of things has God done for us to trust Him? Well, this summer He has provided twenty-two young people who will be ministering to our Dakota kids. When we prayed for specific staffing needs, God answered with just the person He knew we needed. One quick example: we had been praying and asking God to help us be able to offer blacksmithing again as an activity at Flag Mountain. We were looking for a person who was skilled to give instruction, but we also needed a new forge. Lynnette and I prayed and asked God to open the doors if we should proceed with this activity. What did God do? He sent us an instructor, Nathan Rowe, who will also be our camp ranger this summer. However, even before He sent us Nathan, God impressed one member of our Dakota Conference Family to send a donation of \$500 to camp ministry. Why is that number important? Because a brand-new gas forge cost \$497! Isn't God amazing? He knows our needs and impresses others to help sometimes before we even ask.

We also had been praying about our rock-climbing program at Dakota Adventist Camps. Due to circumstances beyond our control, this year we were not going to be able to offer rock climbing at all at either camp. This was a huge burden on our hearts because the rock-climbing activity provides multiple growth areas for our kids besides the obvious area of facing one's fears. As we researched various avenues, we were able to find a mobile rock wall tower that we will be able to transport from one camp to another–and we will have it in time to use THIS SUMMER! It is awesome! We know our campers (and staff) will be thrilled with this new addition to our summer camp program. (If you would like to specifically contribute to help pay off this new wall, please feel free to donate to our Rock Wall Tower of Faith.) We can't wait to share with our campers how God grows our faith through our relationship with Him.

What is happening in your life where you need to be trusting God to work on your behalf? Are you forgetting how He has worked in your life? Are you letting fear and doubt get in the way of the peace that God wants you to have? My prayer for you is that you will take time to look back and see His divine hand and that you will allow Him to lift you up with it.


