

Nothing to Fear

This is the 63rd installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear: The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas*, published in 1983.

Chapter 12: The Lord Gave Freedom - Part 8

Scandinavian evangelists including A.V. Rhoads, M. Ruskjer, O. Ronning, and, later, German evangelists M.H. Schuster and R.T. Nash aided in the work among the multi-cultural settlers of District 7, establishing a church of twenty-two members at Zenith (Stark County) by 1915, companies or Sabbath Schools at Belfield (Stark County), Fryberg (Billings County), Freda (Grant County), and Amidon (Slope County) as well as adding strength to the existing church at Beach. The westward surge of the Adventist church in North Dakota is further demonstrated by the fact that camp meetings were held in 1917 at Wibaux, Montana (across the state line from Beach) and at Belfield during 1918.⁴⁴

Some of the Scandinavians, like Lars Neilsen, employed the methods of the German itinerant evangelists primarily in their work, answering specific calls wherever interest arose from a variety of sources, often the witnessing of a Scandinavian Adventist settler to his new neighbors. Neilsen started a Scandinavian Sabbath School at Eckman (Bottineau County) in 1908 from such a contact, and organized Swedish Churches at Skogmo (Sheridan County) and at Anamoose (McHenry County), (or perhaps a single church made up of members from the area between the two towns) in 1909.⁴⁵

Other Scandinavian evangelists, however, followed the pattern of Martin Olsen, who made Valley City his headquarters and, although branching out to organize a Scandinavian church at Woodworth in 1919 and working with small groups (some may have been organized companies or churches) at Wilton, Lincoln, Lisbon,

Cooperstown (Griggs County), Wimbledon (Barnes County), Clifford (Trail County) or even as distant as Bowesmont (Pembina County), always returning to encourage and reinforce the local congregation that considered him its pastor.⁴⁶

Two of the Scandinavians carried this emerging pastoral concept even further with the aid of their wives, who proved to be effective Bible workers and pastoral assistants in the absence of their husbands.

In 1909, A.V. Rhoads and his wife moved to Minot becoming the first Seventh-day Adventists in one of the state's largest towns and N.M. and Bertha Jorgensen moved from Velva to Grand Forks, where the church had dwindled down to only two members and had possibly been officially disbanded. Neither man actually served as pastor of his respective headquarters church, as the word is used in modern terms. Rhoads, for example, in addition to his extensive work west of the Missouri, conducted a crusade at Leonard (Cass County), apparently resulting in the organization of a company as early as 1910, and assisted M. Ruskjer in the organization of the Harvery Swedish church early in 1914.⁴⁷

But each man, and in his absence, his wife, worked diligently in his home territory also, and provided a rallying point for new and existing church members and the visibility needed to help get other conference resources channeled to the needs of his "pastorate."

Jesus, Our Creator

Genesis 1:1 says, "In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth." On the surface, that looks pretty cut and dried. I would like to plead with anyone reading this to take ten minutes, get your Bible out, and read the first two chapters of Genesis.

I realize that there are some who are only Old Testament or only New Testament Christians. I can only say that Jesus had only the Old Testament and that He inspired the New Testament (2 Timothy 3:16-17). It was not until reading the New Testament that I had light on this subject that helped me understand our topic more fully. John 1: verses 1-3, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through Him, and without Him nothing was made that was made." It's a fair question to ask, who is this "Word"? The safest way to get the right answer is to go to the Bible. If that isn't proof enough, turn to Colossians 1:16-17, "For by Him all things were created that are in heaven and that are on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or principalities or powers. All things were created through Him, and for Him. And He is before all things, and in Him all things consist." Paul very plainly explains that to us.

I'm in my 55th year of construction, and if there is anything I have learned it is that you have to have a good foundation to build on or your house will fall. The same goes for our spiritual foundation. We can't base our whole faith on one or two

verses, much less on tradition. We are told in Hebrews 1:1-3, "God, who at various times and in various ways, spoke in times past to the fathers by the prophets, has in these last days spoken to us by His Son, whom He has appointed Heir of all things, through whom also He made the worlds; who being the brightness of His glory and express image of His person, and upholding all things by the word of His power, when He had by Himself purged our sins, sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on High."

I believe that we have had enough evidence to know beyond a shadow of a doubt, that Jesus was the creator of all things. As we look at the next issue's article, this one will give us faith and hope to believe that He has a vested interest in each and every one of us. God bless and guide us all into a closer walk with Him.

Lehr Prairie Bible Camp

Prairie Bible Camp is a rural, non-denominational youth camp that has been established for over 100 years. It is held at the Lehr Tabernacle, located one mile east of Lehr, North Dakota. This year's event took place on June 13-16, and the camp buzzed with 70 attendees, aged 8-18. For the last 13 years, Adventist youth from across the Dakota Conference and beyond have been involved in leading out as directors and staff of the camp. Prairie Bible Camp has provided amazing opportunities for outreach and evangelism in the community. Camp is run in conjunction with the local non-denominational country camp meeting and in the evening, adults from the community come and join the kids for an evening meeting sermon. This year the evening sermons were presented by Roper Karges, an Adventist young adult from Hazen, North Dakota. The topics covered each evening were the great controversy, justification, sanctification, and glorification.

This year's camp theme was "The King's Character" and the directors focused on better understanding God. They talked about God, His true character, and how the world misunderstands Him and thinks that He desires judgment and death—That He punishes people indefinitely and takes loved ones away. This is not who God truly is. He is a God of love who wants only the best for us as a good Father.

The week of Prairie Bible Camp was filled with devotionals, crafts, field games, water games, service projects, skits, campfires, and much more. One of the fun opportunities provided was a question-and-answer time with the kids to answer the life and spiritual questions that they have on their hearts but aren't getting answers to at home or in their churches. The staff members dug into their Bibles and life experiences to answer the questions from a Biblical perspective. The kids asked probing questions like: "Why did God put the tree in the Garden of Eden for Adam and Eve to sin? If God knows what we'll choose, why do we have choices? How do I know when or how God is speaking to me?" In conjunction with the theme of exploring God's character, staff members had the opportunity to share a *Steps to Christ* with each camper.

Each year it is so exciting to see how God leads, how He touches hearts, and to see how hearts and doors are opened in the community! Please join in praying for the continued guidance of the Holy Spirit in these young people's hearts!

The Dakota Conference of Seventh-day Adventists has recently extended a call to Raman Sathiyaseelan, also known as Mr. Sathiya – pronounced Sateeya. As he completes his visa papers, Pastor Gary D. Wilson, a retired Adventist educator, will be filling in to start the school year.

Raman Sathiyaseelan was born in Sri Lanka and finished high school at Lakphana Adventist College. He then went on to Spicer Adventist College in India and

completed an undergraduate degree from Southern Adventist University as an accounting major. He stayed on and completed his master's degree in education and administration from Andrews University.

Sathiya moved back to Sri Lanka and served at Lakpahana Adventist College as a teacher



and vice principal for seven years (2007-2013). He then taught at Adventist International School in Sri Lanka as an economic, business studies, and accounting

teacher from 2013-2015. In 2015, Sathiya accepted a call to serve as a teacher at Chiang Mai Adventist Academy in Thailand (2015-2018). He has just finished five years in Guam Micronesia Mission of Seventh-day Adventists as principal of Ebeye Adventist K-12 School.

In his own words, "I'm grateful that God is allowing me and my family to join Dakota Adventist Academy as principal. In my spare time, I enjoy outdoor activities such as sports [Sathiya is a very good cricket player], hiking, and swimming. I also enjoy reading. 
Harvey District Starts LeadGenerator Program


