

Nothing to Fear

This is the 64th installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear: The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas*, published in 1983.

Chapter 12: The Lord Gave Freedom - Part 9

Jorgensen spent more than three years at Grand Forks, and, aided by visiting evangelist Lars Neilsen and, later, C.C. Jensen and by Bible workers K.O. and Tillie Shawhem, slowly built the congregation back to moderate size and strength as new members joined with Adventists moving into the area to form a new Grand Forks Church.⁴⁹

Rhoads made Minot his home for an even longer period of time, working house-to-house when he was not away on an itinerary in another part of the conference. By 1910, a small group was meeting on Sabbath which apparently became an organized company by 1912, and in 1915, following evangelistic meetings conducted by M. Ruskjer, E.L. Stewart, and Bible Worker Emma Krebs, the Minot church was formally organized with seventeen members.⁵⁰

In Minot, the actual organization of the church was the work of a second resident "pastor", Ruskjer, who had spent the previous two years headquartered in Minot. C.C. Jensen, the new Scandinavian evangelist made Grand Forks his home base in 1918, conducting an evangelistic crusade the following year, leading to the reorganization of the Grand Forks church early in 1921. A second church was

apparently organized at about the same time at Bowesmont, some sixty miles north of Grand Forks. The close link that obviously existed between the two separate groups in one that still exists at the present time, with Bowesmont members comprising an important segment of the modern Grand Forks church.⁵¹

To help assure their survival and stability, the Minot and Grand Forks congregations immediately entered into building programs to provide permanent worship facilities in these two major population centers. Minot's combined church and school building was soon also the home of a thriving educational program that even provided boarding facilities for elementary students living too far away to commute daily.⁵²

The Scandinavian preachers also did their share of itinerating. Jorgensen spent a period of time in 1913 at Rugby (Pierce County) with limited success; Ronning held an evangelistic crusade at Oakes (Dickey County) in which a single person was baptized; and C.C. Jensen visited with a "little company" at Lignite (Burke County) in 1917. In addition, there was a Scandinavian church at Baldwin, near Bismarck, and Scandinavian groups (possibly churches) at Goodrich and McClusky, during the same time period, requiring at least occasional visits from a Scandinavian minister.⁵³

But amidst this flurry of important activity by the Scandinavians, the death knell for this branch of ethnic evangelism could also be heard sounding. Even as preparations for the organization of the Minot church were being made, the evangelists were lamenting that their work so far in the city had been done, of necessity, in English, and expressed hope of conducting a Scandinavian evangelistic series in the city in the near future and, early in 1921, C.C. Jensen was assigned the care of the English-speaking churches of the area west of the Missouri.⁵⁴

Jamie Howell was born and raised in Niles, Michigan. She attended and graduated from Southern Adventist University. She spent a year as a student missionary in Bolivia working at Familia Feliz, an orphanage and boarding school for students from struggling families. While there, Jamie was a house mom to girls ranging from ages 5-15. She also taught different subjects to grades Kindergarten to eighth grade. After college, she worked for a year at Dakota Adventist Academy (DAA) before accepting a job at Payabya Adventist Mission School on the Pine Ridge reservation. When the school was closed for safety reasons, Jamie accepted a job as a teacher at Rapid City Adventist School teaching grades K-4. She has been enjoying her teaching there and will start her eighth year in the fall.

"Growing up I went to an Adventist school with multi-grade classrooms. I experienced firsthand what Adventist multi-grade education is like and I enjoyed learning about God and His love for me. When I graduated from college I decided I wanted to teach in an Adventist multi-grade classroom. I wanted to create a loving, caring atmosphere as I had experienced. I interviewed for many Adventist teaching positions and I didn't get any of them. I started to think that maybe God wanted me to be in the public school system instead. One day I got a call from a friend who worked at DAA. She told me that there was a job opening in the office and cafeteria. It had nothing to do with teaching, the opposite of what I thought God called me to

do. The call came at a time when I was very unsure of my future and I had been praying and trying to figure out what to do. I believe that God led me to work at DAA that year where I could get to know the conference and the superintendent so that the next year, when a position opened at the Payabya Mission, they knew me and I got the job when I applied. During that hard year at Payabya, I learned to lean on and trust more in God than in myself. I feel like God again showed me where I was supposed to be when the Payabya school was closed and the very next day I was offered a job in Rapid City."



This summer, Flag Mountain Camp experienced significant rainfall. The average rainfall in the area is about 20 inches and locals in the area estimated that nearly 10 inches fell in two days! Because of this, our beautiful winding creek that flows through camp turned into a river, and we were suddenly in danger of our road washing out. Thankfully, Pastor Ted used our tractor to dump tons of dirt and rock onto the road, so that it didn't wash away. We thought our road problems were over, but at the end of teen week, right as we were getting ready for the campers to leave on Sunday, we got the news that another part of the road had issues.

Near the end of the road, there was a huge mud pit that even high-clearance vehicles couldn't get through. Pastor Ted had to take the tractor down the road and literally drag vehicles out of the mud. Well, there was no way we wanted to drag everyone's parents in and out of the camp, so we loaded up campers and their belongings into the back of a pickup truck, drove them down to the mud pit, unloaded them and all of their stuff, and made them walk on a plank across the worst parts of the mud. The next day, we were supposed to leave to go up to

Northern Lights Camp, and a lot of us had low-clearance vehicles that wouldn't make it through the mud. Pastor Ted told us that if we had low-clearance vehicles we would need to wait until 11 in the morning, so it would be easier for us to cross.

We woke up the next morning, and we hadn't heard anything from the people who had left earlier. We sent someone down to check out the mud, and they came running back up half an hour later saying that the camp van and everyone else, who had left for hours previously, were still stuck in the mud! Now it was just Pastor Ted and our camp ranger down there pulling out cars, and it just wasn't working. Then, all of a sudden, some local church members showed up; within 45 seconds of them attaching to the camp van, it was out! They quickly got the rest of the group out, and they immediately started working on the road. By three in the afternoon, the group that had low-clearance vehicles was able to drive out of Flag Mountain Camp without even having to slow down for the mud!

God provided for our camps all summer, and this is just one instance where we saw Him work. There is nothing God can't do, and He puts just the right people in just the right places to help us get through problems and trials in our life. It was awesome to see how God provided a solution to every challenge we encountered this summer. Thank you for all the support and prayers for our camp ministries. 
