

Nothing to Fear

This is the 68th installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear: The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas,* published in 1983.

Chapter 13: Legacy of Uncertainty - Part 2

Not to be discounted is the probable influence of L.R. Conradi, who was then head of the church's work in Europe. The non-combatant stand of the Adventist Church had been staunchly endorsed by Ellen G. White, and Conradi had apparently begun to lose confidence in Mrs. White and her teachings as early as 1888 when she endorsed the church's renewed emphasis on "righteousness by faith" - a position Conradi apparently rejected.¹¹ At the 1913 General Conference of the church, Conradi had cautioned the leadership to act "with great prudence in considering the matter of military service, otherwise they would bring great difficulty to thousands of our brethren."¹²

Finally, and probably most prominent, were the fears, real or imagined, that opposing the government would curtail the work of the denomination and possibly even result in the closing of its churches.

The overwhelming majority of Adventist draftees followed the official position of the church leaders in Germany. Of those who did not, some were able to obtain non-combatant service in the medical corps, but many suffered imprisonment, severe treatment and possibly even death for following their convictions.¹³ A few, angered

by the actions of church and government, issued unfavorable statements against the German government in the name of the church.¹⁴ As a result, Seventh-day Adventist churches in the State of Saxony were closed by the public authority.

Their worst fears apparently confirmed, the German church leadership, Schuberth, Conradi, and Paul Drinhaus, president of the Saxon Conference, entangled in an ever-growing web of circumstances, issued a second statement reaffirming their stand on combatancy on March 4, 1915.¹⁵ Apparently this official statement from church leaders satisfied the German government and churches in Saxony were allowed to reopen.

But to avoid further conflict with the government, church leaders considered it necessary to disfellowship from their local congregations many church members across the nation who opposed the leadership's official stand.¹⁶

Representatives of several groups of these disfellowshipped individuals, cut off from the mainstream of the church both legally and ideologically, met in Magdeburg, Germany at the end of the war. They viewed the German church's position on combatancy and Sabbath observance, and the fact that the General Conference, headquartered in Washington, D.C., had not repudiated that position, as indications of universal apostasy. Perceiving no other choice, these representatives organized themselves into the "International Missionary Society of Seventh-day Adventists, Old Movement standing firm since 1844", the latter phrase later being changed to "Reform Movement."¹⁷

This new organization considered itself to be the true "remnant church." Along with the "apostasies" of combatancy and compromised Sabbath-keeping that seemed to be endorsed by the worldwide leadership of the Seventh-day Adventist Church; they added, what seemed to them, a deemphasis of its historic health reform message and a rejection of the message of righteousness by faith as given at the 1888 Minneapolis General Conference session of the church.¹⁸

In 1920 the reform representatives met with members of the General Conference Committee and the three German Union Committees at Friedensau, Germany to present their case. When asked directly what the General Conference's position on the German leadership's statement regarding combatancy and Sabbath-keeping was, General Conference President A.G. Daniells replied that he did not approve of that declaration because "in it we find expressions that we greatly regret to see." And at a workers' meeting held in connection with this Friedensau gathering, the three German leaders who had issued the second statement publicly acknowledged their error.¹⁹

The reformers found these statements unacceptable, however, and branded them and a later 1923 "Declaration of Principles" on non-combatancy, as "false confessions", because the General Conference statements did not make noncombatancy a test of church fellowship but granted to each member the freedom to serve according to his individual conscience.²⁰

In 1922 the Reform Movement issued an "Open Appeal" to the General Conference, meeting in San Francisco, requesting another hearing on the same issues. Daniells refused to grant the hearing.²¹

In this 1922 "Open Appeal" the German reformers were joined by a top leader of another "reform movement", which arose in America in 1916 under the leadership of Mrs. Margaret W. Rowen.²²

That's pretty awesome! Only


someone who cares deeply about me would bother to learn such intricate details about my life.

the children played in bouncy houses. The festivities included Allison asking Pastor Nate questions about himself and his family so all in attendance could get to know them better.




